## A PHONOGRAPHIC LETTER.

### Thomas Edison Talks to a Friend in California.

The following letter, sent from London by Thomas A. Edison to Major Frank McLaughlin of Oroville, California, was spoken by the great inventor into a phonograph, and the words impressed by the vibration of a mechanical diaphragm on a wax cylinder, and sent to Oroville, California. It reached this office through the kindness of Mr. Louis Glass, Manager of the Pacific Phonograph Company of San Francisco. The cylinder was placed in the phonograph of the APPEAL office, and a compositor set the letter directly from the machine. He was able to do so without the slightest difficulty. The letter as set up directly from the phonograph reads as follows:

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 23, 1889.

MY DEAR MAJOR:—My wife and I arrived here from Paris last Tuesday. The passage was rather rough. My wife was quite sick and hasn't got over it yet. I am entering up arrears in correspondence today, and include you in the number, not because I am indebted to you, but because since I have been here I have met Colt and Harvey, who tell me that they are interested with you in the Golden Gate Mine. What jolly dogs they are! I am really sorry that I could not have been there at the same time that you were. They tell me that you have made America famous in certain localities throughout London. Ha, ha, ha—a, old fellow, I heard lots of things which I am afraid to commit even to a phonograph cylinder. The exhibition in Paris was not altogether a credit to America, but there are many reasons why this should have been so. Of course you must know that I made a special effort, and I must say that I feel fully repaid for the expense and trouble I have had. They feated and treated us over there in the most kindly sort of manner, and Mrs. Edison and I will never forget it. I am anxious to get back to New York, and expect to sail some time next week, but do not yet know on what steamer. I have some new phonographic ideas which I think may be useful, and which I intend to work out as soon as possible. How soon will you be in New York, Major? I trust we will see you soon. With very kind regards from my wife and I, I remain Truly your friend, THOMAS A. EDISON.

To William Davis, the Foreman of the APPEAL composing room, belongs the honor of being the first printer on the Pacific Coast to set type directly from the phonograph, and the APPEAL claims the credit of being the first newspaper to use a phonograph in its composing room.

We trust that our metropolitan contemporaries in San Francisco will see the utility of the instrument in connection with newspaper work, and adopt it in their offices. It is a great saving on the compositors' eyes, and the compositor who set up Mr. Edison's letter is positive that with a little practice he could set faster from the phonograph than from manuscript.

The letter from Edison did not occupy two inches of the cylinder.


