WINDOM'S BREACH OF FAITH.

Secretary Windom's ruling regarding Mexican lead ores has shut down two lead mines in Utah—the Bingham and Brooklyn companies, and three hundred men men are thrown out of employment.

The Republican Administration is not keeping the pledges of its platform of 1888 when it allows a Secretary of the Treasury to strike such blows at the industries of the West. The West has stood shoulder to shoulder with the party, but the day of revolt will come if the party continues to ignore our material interests.

We are heartily in favor of Home Protection—for everything manufactured or produced East of the Missouri river.

Windom is ineligible to the office of Secretary of the Treasury anyhow, as the law makes any citizen engaged in foreign commerce ineligible to the office of Secretary of the Treasury. This law was pulled on Alexander Stewart in Grant's administration and the Senate refused to confirm him.

The only way to secure recognition for the West, is to unite with the four new States, and then with a block of about eighty five votes we can hold out solidly against any Presidential nominee who will not give us a voice in the selection of a Secretary of the Treasury.

If Alger had only been nominated the West would have been on its feet.

THE SUPREME COURT.

The greatest judicial tribunal in the world yesterday convened in Washington for the season of 1889-90.

There is truth in that appellation. The Supreme Court of the United States wield the power to enlarge or restrict the prerogatives of the President or Congress. It may extend or curtail either Federal or State sovereignty. It may modify the frame of government.

Take the Nagle case which will come before the Court this session. It involves a quest on of far reaching importance. The effect of the decision may be to push the domain of national into that of State sovereignty. It is for the Supreme Court to decide this question, and from its decision there is no appeal except to the power of amending the Constitution.

No other judicial tribunal in the world has such a power.

The Court opens with a vacant seat on the Bench. That suggests to President Harrison an important duty to be performed as soon as the Senate is in session.

It opens with a calendar which it will take three years to go through. That involves a delay which amounts to a practical denial of justice. The remedy for this evil is with Congress. To provide it will be one of the most important duties which will devolve upon that body the coming session.—N. Y. Herald, Oct. 15.

A Montana paper says that each of the four hundred of the Anaconda employes, when they presented themselves to vote on election day, handed to the judges of election a slip on which was printed the following:

I cannot read or write the English language, and I wish to vote the straight Democratic ticket.

The Australian ballot system provides that where a person cannot read or write English, he may have his ballot prepared for him by the judges. After presenting a card to the effect that they could not read or write, it was quite superfluous for them to state anything about the ticket they wanted to vote.

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
