He Attempts to Wreck a Train Near Wadsworth.

WADSWORTH, Oct. 27.—A negro tramp was arrested yesterday for attempting to wreck the East bound mail train at a side track a few miles East of town by misplacing a switch. Fortunately Engineer Yergen saw the danger in time to stop the train. The man, who gave the name of John Henry Smith, and said he had come from Denver, Col., where he had worked as second cook in a hotel, had a preliminary examination before Justice Taylor and was bound over in the sum of \$500 to appear before the Grand Jury.

He is now confined in the lock-up, awaiting transportation to Reno.

Upon this and other information received, the under Sheriff made application for an order transferring Elliott to some other jail. Last Thursday about 6 p. m. immediately after the order was made out, the under Sheriff started for Bakersfield via Mohave with the prisoner, and turned him over to Sheriff of that county last Saturday night.




