A Young Lad Snaked in Jail for His Levity.

Although it may not be generally known, there is an ordinance in this city against the snowballing of pedestrians on the street. The fine for such an offense is \$20 and upwards, somewhere into the hundreds of dollars, we believe.

Yesterday a young boy named Sneed was arrested by the Sheriff for swatting a pedestrian in the ear with a snowball.

Of course, no man who is walking quietly along the street and minding his own business likes to get smacked in the jaw or elsewhere with what is known to schoolboys as a "soaker."

Yet the APPEAL will bet \$1000 even up that there is not a man in town who did not, in his boyhood days, take a delight in banging snowballs at any and everybody.

When the writer lived in Newark, N. J., it was considered rare fun for a dozen boys to take possession of the roof of a building and heave snowballs as big as a peck measure on the heads of the police. The police were obliged to bore holes in their hats so as not to suffocate under the circumstances.

When the boys got possession of the roof by way of the skylight they built a high chimney of snow around the opening so as to prevent the owner of the building from getting up on the roof.

The chimney of snow was about six feet high, and no man yet had the nerve to try and reach the top of one from the inside.

No pleasure of existence was half so sweet as this, yet yesterday when he got a similar visitation in his own ear from a street gamin he wanted his scalp to hang up somewhere.

SMALL COINS.

Five-Cent Nickel and One Cent Pieces Furnished on Application.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Secretary Windom has approved the following circular, issued today by Director of the Mint Leach: Five-cent nickel and one-cent bronze pieces will be furnished in the order of applications from the United States Mint at Philadelphia, Penn., to points reached by the United States and connecting express companies, free of transportation charges, in sums of \$20 or multiples thereof, upon receipt and collection by the Superintendent of that mint of a draft on New York or Philadelphia, payable to his order to points not reached by express companies, where delivery under contract with the Government is impracticable. These coins will be sent by registered mail at applicant's request, a fee to be paid the Government. A supply of these coins will be kept on hand by Assistant Treasurers of the United States at New York, Boston, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, New Orleans and San Francisco, and applications for them in these cities should be made to the sub-Treasury.

There has been land enough taken up under our liberal State laws by private individuals and large cattle owners that is covered by water, to support 1,000 families at least. Wm. Dunphy's possessions in Elko, Lander, Eureka and Humboldt counties, contain land and water enough to make 80-acre homes for 700 or 800 families, and each family would not only make a good living, but make money besides.—Gazette.

When an attempt is made in California to raise money to build levees, the close-fisted agriculturalists of the Sacramento Valley refuse to put up the money necessary to make the levees impregnable. Now they see thousands of acres of newly planted grain swept by a rushing torrent and their cattle swept down into the sea. Many lives have also been sacrificed. 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
