

A LYING MORMON CIRCULAR.

He found that the poor miners were driven at times to live on soup made from mules and other animals that died in the service. He also found women working, poorly clad and fed, in the coke regions, at starvation wages, against hordes of pauper European who overrun the country as veritable Goths and Vandals. With this state of affairs staring us in the face, it is no wonder that men sigh for the coming of the time when America will be for Americans.

One of the best points in Mr. Blaine's rejoinder to Mr. Gladstone's free-trade argument is that in which he made clear that the one industry which the United States has denied protection—namely, shipbuilding—has languished, while the same industry, which happens to be the only one Great Britain protects, has made phenomenal advances in that country. Any one unable to see the force of this illustration must be particularly dull. It seems to demonstrate conclusively that protection is the only reliable method of stimulating an industry.


