

STORAGE RESERVOIRS.

The storm which has showered such a bountiful supply of snow throughout our mountains brings with it a moral. When the influential men of Nevada offered to advance in the interests of irrigation, the fossils held back and refused to act.

The heavy snows now lead them to think that the State will need no storage reservoirs as water will be plentiful and within the next year or two will be plenty of time to consider the matter.

This is an incorrect way to look at the question as the custom of waiting for a necessity has often thrown grand enterprises into the mire.

Had the reservoirs been built five years ago when the movement was first started we would next year have stood out in bold relief with success in the foreground. The reservoirs could have been constructed so that the capacity would have been double the supply, thereby preparing for a storm like the one which has covered the entire county and the result would have been full reservoirs, and plenty to spare. Should the pressure in any event become too strong the gates could be opened and the excellent drainage in the valleys would be a safe-guard against accidents.

The people of Nevada will never see the necessity of a step to the front until the chief movers are weary of their existence and cease to labor.

It is to be hoped that the bountiful supply of water next year will not be a draw-back to the completion of some of the irrigation schemes which tend only to benefit us.

LOSS ON SILVER.

Dr. Delavan, writing from Virginia City to the New York Mining Record, says:

"Were the rights of free coinage restored to the people, we would again see mining lift its head, and that shares would be sought after. The present discount on silver is a fearful drag on our mines. In many cases it means the difference between dividends and assessments, and in other cases the difference between the working of the mines and their lying idle. Take the Com. Cal. & Va. for instance, and note the difference there would be seen to stockholders in dividends. This year ('89), thus far, they would received \$566,328.44 now lost to them. Last year they would have been \$632,064.47 better off, the year before, \$554,374.47, and so on."
