A MILD SNOW. Compared to Some of the Maine Snows.

"This may be considered a lively winter for this section," said drummer Pfaff, the other day in Friend's, "but up in Maine where I used to live, they had winters they did—why a day like today, wouldn't cause the postponement of a Sunday School picnic. Fact gentlemen, I assure you and I've traveled for one of the most reliable houses on the Coast for twelve years. After a big storm in my little old town, there wasn't the vestige of anything in sight but the church steeples and the little old First Methodist Church had such a short steeple that sometimes in a big snow it went out entirely.

"Of course snow shoes were all the go and the man who couldn't dance a waltz in snow shoes, was set down on as a poor dancer.

"Ladies waltz in snow shoes, well I should think they did waltz, you never know what the real poetry of motion is until you waltz with a Maine girl. I've waltzed in twelves and a girl wearing tens and we never got tangled up or made a mistep. Tens and twelve of course mean ten and twelve feet long, that's the way they gauge sizes up there.

"Many people die up there, well yes, a good many. You see, Maine is a prohibition State and when the hard winters strike the country, it mows down the temperance people in swathes.

"Blood must have a little alcoholic stimulant in to stand off a low thermometer. I've seen it so cold there that the horses hoofs would fly off and swat the driver in the eye.

"The whole hoof would fly off and I've seen the air full of horses hoofs on a Saturday afternoon, when the whole town would be out, but of course the livery men never lost anything when business was good. You know the hoofs all grew out in the spring.

"Everything would shrink with the intense cold to one half its size. Many a time I've started out with my pocket full of twenty dollar pieces and came back with nothing but a pecker full of tens. This has been regular May pole picnic weather here during the last few weeks, fact, I assure you."
