FREE COINAGE OF SILVER.

Senator Mitchell of Oregon
Makes an Effort in Behalf of
the White Metal.

WASHINGTON.—Jan 30.—In the
Senate today a bill was reported for
the further appropriation of \$350,-
000 for a public building at Los
Angeles.

Mitchell addressed the Senate on
the bill for the free coinage of silver.
It was, he said, a subject involving
contention in the main between the
rich and the poor, between the deb-
tor and the creditor class. It in-
volved a gigantic effort—or perhaps
the term "conspiracy" might not
be unappropriate—on the part of
a special class and its allies to de-
press values, in order that the price
of creditors' bonds and notes and
mortgages and gold coin might be
increased in value and their power
of absorption augmented. The
pending bill, he said, was not a
demand for the issue of an unlim-
ited supply of money, as all agreed
that such a policy would be suicidal.
It was a bill, however, to provide
for a sufficient amount of circulat-
ing medium to meet the largely in-
creased and largely increasing busi-
ness of the country, and which
would tend to check the alarming
decline in the value of farms, farm
products and other commodities.
The question was whether the
double standard of money should
be re-established, or whether gold
alone should continue to be the
monetary standard? Was the
financial ship of America to sail
only in the wake of the golden
tramps of Great Britain.

Mitchel went on to argue that the
only way to restore and secure na-
tional prosperity was to provide by
law for the free and unlimited coin-
age of silver bullion into standard
silver dollars of the present weight
and fineness, and to give to that
coinage the debt paying functions
of a legal tender—of course, with
proper restrictions to protect mints
from imposition—and also to pro-
vide for the issue of legal tender
certificates based on silver coinage.
He regarded the Windom bill as
fatally defective as it new stood,
but with slight amendments it
stood third in his estimation as a
measure in the right direction.
Free and unlimited coinage stood
first.

Railroaders Men Blown Up.
SUNBURY, Pa., Jan. 29.—A gang
of Italians, Poles and Hungarians,
employed in repairing the roadbed
of the Shamokin, Sunbury & Lewis-
burg railroad, were at work today
in a cut near Paxin's, when a blast
was suddenly exploded and the
men were hurled in all directions.
Ten others were badly cut and
Three Italians are missing and it is
feared they are buried under the
debris.
