A dispatch received in this city yesterday announced the death of Mrs. O. R. Leonard, in Sacramento. The lady has been in poor health for some time and her death was not unexpected.

The report of Secretary Stoddard, of the State Agricultural Society, shows that the total receipts for the Fair of 1889 were \$38,841 95; disbursements, \$40,094 71, leaving an indebtedness of \$1,252 78.

The reports of a famine at Sierra City are unbounded. There is an abundance of food and plenty of beef cattle within ten miles of the town. There is from eight to eleven feet of snow there on a level.

In repairing the water pipe which runs from Marlette Lake to Virginia City. Supt. Overton was obliged to sink a shaft through twenty-five feet of snow. A regular bucket and windlass had to be used, the same as in mining.

Secretary Rusk has written a letter to the Home Market Club of Boston, in which he says there is nothing in the soil and climate of this country to prevent the production of every class of wool remuneratively and in commercial quantities.

About sixty bodies have been recovered from the Walnut Grove, Arizona, wreck. Coffins have been made at the lower dam and floated down to Wickenburg, where the bodies are buried as soon as found. All the bodies are nude when found, and some are badly mutilated.

THOSE ALLECED CROOKED SURVEYS.

The Decisions of the Interior Department Final and the Case will Not be Reopened.

Settlers and stockmen along the boundary line of Humboldt and Elko counties complained of crookedness in the surveys, and that advantage had been taken by the United States Surveyor General, of knowledge acquired by him in his official capacity to apply through agents for the lands at the State Land Office the moment the plats of the lands said to have been surveyed were filed in the United States Land Office at Carson. Affidavits were sent to Washington by settlers, who claimed to have had corals and other improvements on the lands, a Special Inspector was sent to examine the surveys and the matter was suspended by the General Land Office. Last June the order of suspension was revoked. As soon as the fact was ascertained by the settlers they requested Senator Jones to use his influence to get the case reopened and petitions to that effect were numerous signed in Humboldt, Northern Lander and Elko counties to that effect. The following correspondence regarding the matter explains itself: SENATOR JONES TO H. J. PRATT.

UNITED STATES SENATE, WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7, 1890.

DEAR SIR:—I am in receipt of your esteemed favor, which was greatly delayed by severe storms, or it would have been earlier acknowledged.

I duly presented the petition, and having a personal acquaintance with a large number of the gentlemen signing it, I assured the Commissioner of the General Land Office of the high respectability and the entire good faith of the petitioners. I also requested him to take the matter up and decide it as quickly as possible.

In a personal interview the Commissioner informed me that inasmuch as the land had been formerly turned over to the State, the jurisdiction of the general Government over the question had ceased.

I inclose his written statement, for the information of the gentlemen uniting in the petition. Very truly yours,

COM. GROFF TO SENATOR JONES.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, GENERAL LAND OFFICE, WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5 1890.

HON. J. P. JONES, U. S. SENATE.

Sir: On the 30th ultimo, you filed here in person, the petition of certain citizens of Nevada, making allegations in relation to the letting of contract No. 174, dated November 14, 1884, by the then Surveyor General C. C. Powning, the manner of the execution of surveys under said contract, and the action of this office thereon. This petition is understood to refer particularly to the surveys of townships specified as follows, viz:

Table with 2 columns: Township, Range. Rows: Township 38, 39, 40, north, range 45 east; 40, 46; 38, 40, 47; 40, 48; 38, 39, 40, 44.

After the above described townships were surveyed, the surveys accepted by this office, and the plats of the surveys filed in the local land offices, certain State selections were made of lands embraced therein, and on allegations affecting the regularity of the surveys, the whole matter was suspended. On June 18, 1889, before I became Commissioner, the subject was taken up and considered by this office, as a result of which the State selections were submitted to the Hon. Secretary of the Interior for approval. They were approved by him, June 21, 1888. This action was a final decision of the question involved, so far as this Department is concerned, and it has no jurisdiction to reopen the matter and order a "new hearing" as requested by the petitioners. Petition returned herewith.

DIED FROM EXPOSURE.—On the 8th of last month Mr. Barrett of Fort Churchill, found an old Hebrew peddler in a deserted cabin on the outskirts of the ranch. The man was in a half starved condition and had both of his feet frozen. Mr. Barnett took him home and administered to him as best he could until last Tuesday, when he died. When found in the cabin the man said he had been there five days. He had two pack horses with him and a couple of boxes of trinkets. Mr. Barnett had the remains interred, says the Lyon County Times, and informed Commissioner Shaw of the facts in the case. From papers found in the clothes of deceased it was learned that his name was David Hessler, and that he was 72 years of age. Besides the horses and goods he had, \$40 in money was found in deceased clothes.


