Grand Jury Report.

A good many people are inquiring why the Grand Jury made no report. The Jury was not called on to examine the affairs of the county until their term was more than half over. They then asked for an expert under the law, and the County Commissioners appointed one.

The idea of the Grand Jury was that after the expert's report of the condition of the books of various county officials, a regular investigation of county affairs would take place.

When the expert made his report it was returned as not being deemed by them as sufficiently explicit as to facts and figures. As the tenure of office under the law had nearly expired the Grand Jury was discharged, and consequently made no report.

In justice to the officers whose books were examined, it may be stated that the expert reported but few discrepancies, and those were in the collection of fees through a misunderstanding of laws, which in many instances would require a Philadelphia lawyer to interpret. As far as the Grand Jury were able to ascertain the county affairs were in good condition and honestly administered.

COAST NEWS.

Several prominent farmers of Walla Walla, Wash., have received threatening letters that they will be killed unless they stop buying land and reduce their rates of interest.

Lucien Curtis, owner of the Merced Flour Mills, was thrown from his carriage Thursday and dragged some distance, having been caught in the lines. It is believed his injuries are serious.

Alf. Low, the depot newsboy at Ogden, a little deformed man, known to every overland traveler since the Pacific railroads were built, died Thursday. He was born in London thirty nine years ago.

Homer H. Brown, recently declared sane, though he had been kept close by his relatives for twenty-two years, is missing from Seattle and is supposed to have been spirited away by his relatives who are interested in his property.

The Sonoma County Horticultural Commission have inspected a number of Sicily lemons and found them badly infested with long grover scales, a pest common to Florida or Louisiana. The commissioners will perfect a quarantine against foreign infected fruits.

William Bennett of Salt Lake City, and John Mitchel of San Francisco, lost their lives in a storm on Yukon, Alaska. It is believed that Frank Muzzy of Monhana and John Ackerman of Wyoming lost their lives about the same time by drowning.

The Tuscan Citizen says: Near Mountain Springs, on the road between Tuscon and Tres Almos, there is a very extensive cave, which is as yet unexplored. Many of the neighboring ranchmen have secured some very beautiful specimens of lime carbonates. Soldiers from Fort Lowell have penetrated this cave more than a mile, and they report that the end was not met. How far the cave extends is a query.

AN UNFORTUNATE AFFAIR.—An unfortunate affair occurred at the Pyramid House Thursday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, says the Reno Journal. A couple of drunken men were exceedingly annoying and insulting to Charley Frisch, and Charley put one of them out in the street, and as he got his man on the stairs on a level with the street, the fellow said, according to Frisch's statement, "you son of a b—, I'll shoot you seven times," making a movement as he spoke, for his right hip pocket. This so excited Charley that he hit the man on the head twice with a beer mallet which he carried in his right hand during the time he was trying to put the man out of the saloon. The first blow did not phase the man, but the second blow felled him to the ground, cutting a big gash on the head over the left ear.
