

THE GOOD TIME COMING.

A special to the Salt Lake Tribune from Washington, dated April 8th, says:

All the Eastern papers are now devoting increased attention to the prospective silver legislation. The handwriting on the wall is too plain to be ignored. Liberal legislation in the interest of silver is assured. Whether or not immediate free coinage will be insisted on and carried by the ultra-silver men is now the only question.

Both the New York Tribune and the Philadelphia Ledger inform their readers of the certainties of the future, and predict the triumph of silver. The former journal to-day devotes a column to show the differences between the Senate and House bills, and suggests that the Senate is likely to adopt the most liberal of the two measures. The Ledger sounds a note of alarm at the rapid growth of the free coinage sentiment, and warns the Republicans that under the House bill, as it stands, free coinage will naturally come from the advanced price of silver bullion. At the same time, it notes the boasts of certain Senators that immediate free coinage is to-day a possibility, and states that if such a bill passes, which is far from unlikely, the President might be compelled to veto it. Those better informed know better. The President is urging strongly immediate legislation to rehabilitate silver and will not nullify the action of Congress, what ever it may be.

The above shows plainly how things are drifting in the East.

Now, what has caused this sudden change of front?

Have the lawmakers received more light on the subject of silver?

Not much!

The four new States that have been admitted to the Union are Republican, and they are largely interested in the production of silver.

These new States throw the balance of party power to the West.

The political center of gravity is no longer in Wall Street.

The party has decided to bow to the new power of the West; not because free coinage is right, but because it is good political policy to have it.

We will win our fight by getting up and insisting on our rights. The cry has gone up all over the West, "Give us silver legislation or we will swamp you in 1892."

Now, the Republican party don't propose to be swamped in 1892.

Not if it knows itself. It will pass a silver bill to keep peace with the West.

We are now in a position to show them that peace with the West is better than an alliance with Wall Street.

We mean business out this way, and the woods are full of as good and as tried Republicans as ever voted the regular straight ticket, who will no longer train with the party if it does not reverse the demonization outrage of 1873.

IS IT NULL AND VOID?

The Reno Gazette is authority for the statement that the advocates of the Nevada Lottery have secured the opinion of Judge Messick and William Woods that the special election in 1889 was null and void, and that this being the case the constitutional amendments will be again submitted. While unable at the present time to discuss the legal merits of the case, the APPEAL distinctly recollects that at the time the election was pending, the anti-lottery people were everywhere chuckling over the proposition that if the Lottery amendment won they would knock it gally west in the Supreme Court as they had it from the best lawyers in the State that the failure of the bill to provide for registration of voters was a fatal defect and would render the whole election null and void. If these people were correct in their assertions then, the same rule holds good now.


