Yesterday afternoon there was a lottery drawing at Odd Fellows' Hall. It was a show given for children; admittance 15 cents, and nuts, candies, jewelry and clothes were held out as inducements to get the crowd in. The place was packed with children as a matter of course. Yet there was no one about denouncing the proposition as "immoral." This is indeed a queer country. No arrests.

The first intimation the editor of the APPEAL had of the existence of the fact that there was to be an exhibition in the city, was about noon yesterday when a little girl came along side and remarked:

"Say, Pop, gimme fifteen cents to go to the Gold and Silver Carnival."

For the next two hours, children were busy all over town scurrying about to get hold of fifteen cents to go to the show.

Yesterday the Public Schools were flooded with circulars from which the following is extracted: Special treat for school children!

MISS HILLER'S GOLD and SILVER CARNIVAL Candies, Nuts, Tropical Fruits.

To the Ladies and Teachers.

No entertainment has ever been offered more delightful than this and none enjoy it more heartily than the little ones, so we have decided on giving an entertainment for that purpose that would be suitable and very amusing to the scholars. Ladies, come with the children, you will enjoy it. If not able to come yourself, send the little ones. We will take good care of them and send them home with smiling faces and light hearts. To make the entertainment more interesting, we have purchased several hundred pounds of choice mixed candies. Every scholar will positively receive a package of mixed candy, in many of which gold and silver will be packed and given to the scholars. You may get a gold dollar, silver 50 or 25c piece, with your package of candy, or the ticket for the handsome doll and china tea sets. Every scholar will positively receive a package of candy. Two extra presents are generally given away, consisting of boy's suits of clothing and a handsome silk dress pattern for a girl. Children always lucky. Let all go and enjoy themselves. Proper care and attention will be shown the children. So every scholar must bring this ticket and 15 cents. Odd Fellows' Hall, after school at 4:30 P. M. All over by 6:30 o'clock.

The APPEAL doesn't object to a troupe that distributes prizes to the children who patronize it, in the shape of candy and nuts, but when it advertises it as a "carnival of gold and silver" and rings in allusions to "suits of clothes" and "silk dress patterns," which it doesn't advertise to give, but says that they are "generally given," it is time to call a halt.

A good show for 15 cts doesn't need any such inducements as are held out in the above circular.

Every child who went there expected a chance at a shower of gold and silver, and also a whack at a suit of clothes or a silk dress.

The writer called on the manager of the exhibition, and in response to questions he admitted that they only gave away large prizes when the audience was large.

Now it strikes us that in order to make that sort of a game "on the square," every article named in the cunningly worded printed circular should be distributed if there were only fifty people in the house. It is clear that each child investing in the proposition does so with the idea the drawing will be properly conducted and if articles are withheld when the houses are small the children are not very squarely dealt with.

Newspaper publishers who advertise lotteries in this state are subjected to the expose of jury trials, while people who travel through the country with a little game such as the one alluded to are not interfered with by the so-called moral element."

ATTACHING AN INSURANCE POLICY.

A Point of Law Raised in the Justice Court.

Justice Hawthorne had a nice point of law to decide on Saturday last. Mrs. Cynthia Hyde, the widow of the late M. M. Hyde was indebted to a merchant for \$31 85, which sum she declined to pay, stating to the collector that she had decided to settle all claims for 40 cts on the dollar.

The claim was then placed in the hands of Attorney Summerfield for collection. Mrs. Hyde told the attorney that she did not propose to talk with him on the subject and he then attached a check for \$2,500 in the hands of D. Kersey, Agent of the North-Western Masonic Aid Association, being the payment of a policy on the life of the deceased husband.

The case was called in Justice Hawthorne's Court and her attorney demurred to the complaint on the ground that she was not responsible for her deceased husband's debts and that the Insurance money was sacred from attachment.

The merchant's attorney called attention to the fact that it was for boy's clothing and the estate must pay and she was liable as Administratrix of the estate.

The Court overruled the demurrer and set the case for today at 10 o'clock. After the point was raised of the exemption of life insurance from attachment, Mr. Summerfield levied another attachment on the the house and personal property.

The case is causing considerable talk in the city and a good deal of interest is manifested relative to the disposal of the question as to whether life insurance money is subject to attachment.

Elko On Deck

The Elko Free Press claims that it does not get its share of offices, and will make a loud call on the Convention this year. It says:

"The total number of State offices to be filled, including one United States Senator and one Congressman, outside of the State Legislature, is nineteen, of which eighteen are to be elected by the people, and one by the Legislature."

"There are fourteen organized counties in the State, of which number Washoe, Elko and Storey are the three most important in point of population and taxable property. While the claims of Storey and Washoe, and in fact many of the smaller counties have been fully recognized by important positions on the State ticket, Elko county seems to have been entirely overlooked. For illustration, Lincoln county, with its insignificant tax list and meagre vote, has had a place upon the State ticket for the last twelve years. The same is true of White Pine, whose claims have been recognized by having two positions for a similar period. Storey county has always had a United States Senator, with other important positions upon the ticket. Ormsby county has now a United States Senator and a Congressman, besides State Treasurer and one Regent. And so you may go through the entire list of counties.

"Besides these facts all the patronage of the Federal Government by the way of Public Institutions and officers for same seem to be selected from the West end of the State, within a stone-throw of the dividing line between California and Nevada. Also all of the State Institutions.

"In view of the above facts the Republican delegation from Elko county to the next State Convention will demand as a matter of justice, a more pronounced recognition upon the State ticket. Elko will claim two prominent positions upon the ticket."
