## Madi Gras at Ogden.

The APPEAL has received a communication from Rex II, who will act as King of the coming Carnival at Ogden.

Some time ago an envoy extraordinary was sent from New Orleans to establish a carnival seat in the Rocky Mountain District.

His Majesty's ambassador reported that a circle made of the great mining camps of his western domain, including Eureka and Virginia City, Nev.; Helena and Butte, Mont.; Leadville and Aspen, Col. and all other producers of the white and yellow metals, has the city of Ogden as its centre. In a few hours the armies of his faithful subjects, from these cities, can gather together at his royal capital.

## THE CARNIVAL OF REX II

Will last five days, from June 30, to July 5, 1890, inclusive. The programme arranged by the Carnival Court is a grand one. On July 1, their Majesties Rex I and II will arrive on the royal train from the Crescent City, accompanied by the Dukes of their Majesties' kingdoms. Special trains will follow the royal train.

They will convey the military organizations of the various cities from New Orleans to Ogden. Upon the approach of the King's train a salute of 100 guns will announce the coming of the royal host to Ogden. Just outside the city the royal train will be boarded by the mayor and city officials of Ogden. The mayor will welcome Rex I and his cousin Rex II, and turn the keys of the city over to Rex II, King of Mirth and Revelry.

## COAST NEWS.

W. C. Tariton of Prineville, Or., was dragged to death by a runaway team last Sunday. He was a leading stock raiser in that section of the country.

An unknown man shot at Tehama county's Treasurer, M. Brown, Sunday morning early, because the latter wouldn't give him money.

The Salvation Army of Los Angeles will fight the ordinance which prohibits parading with a drum. Seventeen of the army were arrested Sunday evening.

John Cunningham, a well-known farmer of Sonoma county, was found dead Sunday on the Griggs place, near Windsor. The body was badly decomposed. Cunningham was worth about \$20,000, and it is supposed he was murdered.

The trial of Ed Turner, the negro pugilist of Gilroy, for attempted assault on a nine-year old octo-noon girl, resulted in a disagreement the jury being evenly divided. The negro conducted his own defense.

**A NOVEL INVENTION.**—A. Frechette and P. Dupuis, have invented a little apparatus to shut off gas after being blown out. It is about the circumference of a half dollar, and screws on the gas fixture the same as an ordinary jet. The machinery of the thing is entirely hidden. About 40 seconds after the gas is blown out, one near the contrivance hears a slight click and the gas is shut off. The passing of a lighted match over the opening shows no gas. In order to light the gas after that, a small screw is turned and the contrivance is ready to resume business. In large cities the gas companies suffer enormous loss by the gas being blown out by the wind, and the gas which escapes is considerable. In hotels the bucolic patron who blows out the gas before retiring, instead of being asphyxiated, wakes up in the morning invigorated and refreshed. The invention will soon be introduced in all leading hotels in big cities. Patents are pending in France, England, Germany, Italy, Canada and the United States.
