**COLORADO IN LINE.**

On May the 3rd. a meeting of the Colorado Silver Association was held at the Tabor Opera House in Denver. Hon. H. A. W. Labor, the president, called the meeting to order. After several ringing speeches were made the following resolution was adopted, amid great enthusiasm:

Resolved: That we urge upon our Senators and Representatives in Congress to stand firm for the free and unlimited coinage of silver on the same basis with gold; and we call upon the Farmer's Alliances all over the country to join us in securing its remonetization. If successful they will bring back the price of lands and the products of their labor to where they were in 1873, when silver was demonetized.

While the silver producers of Colorado are meeting and voicing the wishes of the people on the silver question, it may be as well to call attention to the fact that no silver meetings are called in this section and no agitation is being conducted in the interests of silver except by the press of the State.

How long will this state of affairs continue?

**CLEVELAND'S DILEMMA.**

Fred. C. Crawford, the reporter who wrote the famous interview in the New York World, will have a long statement in next week's Frank Leslie's, in which the following will occur:




