THE STAR OF BETHLEHEM.—Prof. Wiggins claims to have looked at the star of Bethlehem which now illuminates the northern horizon. The following will enable one to find it: "To night at 9 o'clock, if clear, look at the North Star. The constellation commonly called the Dipper will be over your head. Now draw a line through the middle of the Dipper, through the North Star and so on down to the horizon; near the horizon this line will pass through the chair of Cassiopea, five stars in the form of a letter W. Within a few inches, apparently, of the big star at the right and upper part of the W appears the so called Star of Bethlehem. Tycho Brahe saw it in 1572, when it was larger than Jupiter and was visible at noon. Its magnitude, however, gradually decreased, and in two weeks it disappeared."

SHUT DOWN THE GATES.—John McKinney, of Lake Tahoe was down from his place this week. He went to Auburn and got some legal advice as to the matter of closing the gates of the dam at the outlet of the lake. He was advised that he could compel them to be raised and recover any damages which might be inflicted on him by reason of being closed. Johnson proceeded to say that one of the convicted Indians was the father of two children and the other of one, and that if the fathers went to jail the little ones would starve, and he appealed to the Court to know how they were to be fed. He was informed that the people would have to contribute to their support while their fathers were in hock, and this suggestion was followed up by a request from the Indian attorney that he be furnished with a "paper" on Tom Hymers for a sack of flour.

The Indians were sent up for twenty five days each.
