THE POTTSES HUNG.

THE LAST KISS ON THE GALLOWS.

Mrs. Potts' Head Almost Severed from the Body.

ELKO, June 20.—The Pottses were hung this morning at 10:45. There were about seventy-five spectators inside the yard where the gallows was erected. After the death warrant was read the doomed couple seated themselves on stools and the Sheriff tied their limbs with leather straps. The officers then shook hands with the pair, and Mrs. Potts thanked the Sheriff for his kindness to herself and husband.

As they stood on the gallows side by side Potts touched his wife's wrist and she turned and kissed him. After the ropes were adjusted they both protested their innocence. When the drop fell an artery was ruptured in Mrs. Potts' neck, and a stream of blood flowed over her white robe. She died instantly. Potts was about fifteen minutes in dying. No one claiming the remains they were buried in the Potter's field.

The APPEAL is of the opinion that the two deserved to die, and that they murdered Fawcett for the double purpose of getting his money and putting him away because of his knowledge of another crime committed by Mrs. Potts.

The evidence of the prosecution although circumstantial is very strong. Fawcett had loaned the Potts' money and was unable to collect it. He called at the house on New Years Eve with several hundred dollars in his pocket and before he went, told a Mr. Limeberger that he knew enough about Mrs. Potts to hang her and would tell what he knew if she did not settle. He never came out of the house alive.

The day following, Potts and his son Charley gave out that Fawcett had settled up his business, giving Mrs. Potts a bill of sale for all his property, and that he had departed for parts unknown.

The next day Mrs. Potts told her neighbors that she was going East to visit her relatives, and departed on the train that evening. About two months afterward she returned to Carlin. On the 28th of September, 1888, the Potts and sold out their property in Carlin, including that which had belonged to Fawcett, for which they had a forged bill of sale, and removed to Rock Springs Wyoming.

The defence was that Fawcett, attempted to outrage Edith Potts, a girl of five years, and that after he confessed his guilt he gave Mrs. Potts a bill of sale of his property and blew out his brains. This they alleged occurred on New Years Eve.

Now it is absurd to claim that a man about to do this would ask a friend to accompany him to the house.

The alleged bill of sale was found to be forged and it was clearly shown that Fawcett's brains were not blown out. There were no pistol marks on him, but his death was shown to have been caused by a blow from an ax.

Charley Potts said he was asleep in an adjoining room and did not hear any disturbance nor the explosion of the pistol. He did not know that Fawcett was dead until his father called him to go with him to Fawcett's ranch.

There are a number of houses quite close to the one in which the tragedy was enacted, but none of their inmates heard a shot on the night in question. The men at work in the railroad shops adjoining swore that they heard no pistol shot.

All through the trial the numerous falsehoods of the defendant were nailed to the wall. It has been urged that the hanging of a woman would be a blot on Nevada. If she was guilty of the crime charged, she has no claim whatsoever on the sympathy of the community.

TWO HUMAN SKELETONS FOUND.—A gentleman who arrived per last evening's V. & T. express, reports that just before he left Franktown, Alex Twaddle and two others who had just returned from a stock hunting trip, reported that in the sand hills east of Washoe Lake they discovered the skeletons of two men who had evidently been dead many months. One of the skeletons was on his face with both arms out-stretched. The train left Franktown before our informant could gather any more particulars.—Gazette.
