BARTINE'S POSITION.

I anyone d... is Bartine's position on the free coinage question... I have read the following from the Salt Lake Tribune's special from Washington of June 20th:

Bartine of Nevada, who has been one of the most earnest, aggressive, conscientious and untiring friends of the mining interests in the House, who worked with the hardest workers against free silver-lead ores and who has been a free coinage advocate of no uncertain vote, said to me today: "I can't see how a free coinage bill can fail to pass. Certainly the free coinage Republicans can take no back steps. When it seemed as if a 4,500,000-ounce coinage was all that was possible, some of us, myself among the number, were inclined to support such a measure, but with the question fairly presented we would do violence to our convictions if we failed to stand squarely and honestly for free coinage, despite the threats and persuasions of our party associates. I believe that even should President Harrison veto the bill, he will direct Mr. Windon to purchase \$4,500,000 a month of silver under the Bland law, which will be a silver victory and better than the bill passed by the House."

Of the recent Navarro-Anderson marriage the Salt Lake Tribune says: It would be good if the young women on both sides of the sea would learn a lesson from the marriage of Mary Anderson. Marriage is the most solemn covenant that human beings can make. It is the most sacred rite that humane beings ever solemnized; and to make a display of it, to make it an advertising dodge for toadyism and shoddyism is something abhorrent to deep thinking men and women. Mrs. Navarro has done many sensible things in her time, but the act that demonstrates the purity of her character, the depth of her heart and the strength of her brain better than any other act of her life, was the way she insisted that her marriage should be conducted. Young ladies should take notice accordingly.

The papers are having a good deal to say about the incident of Journalist Bromley meeting Slogger Sullivan and refusing to shake hands with him. The Record Union says: "Sullivan shrunk away from the newspaper man like the coward that he was, and further intimates that if Sullivan was ever called on to strike out there was his time." It would appear to the ordinary observer that the fact that Sullivan refrained from striking Bromley was a pretty fair evidence that he had some decency left in him. The newspaper man did a brave and commendable thing, but Sullivan who could have knocked him senseless at a blow, did the next best thing and quietly walked away. A giant who knows his strength pockets more insults, as a rule, than any other class of men.

Charles Michelson, an Examiner reporter who attended the execution yesterday, is a young man of pleasant address and withal quite sociable. Unlike the average newspaper reporter, he is not possessed of the impudence and supreme gall with which many of them are affected.—Independent.


