Hunting for Mines.

Nearly all of our state exchanges make mention of the arrival of mining men and experts in their localities, for the purpose of examining mining properties with a view to purchase. In many instances they are bound for outside districts which have not been visited by anyone except the owners of claims therein, since they were organized, and which have heretofore failed to attract the notice or attention of capitalists or those on the lookout for favorable prospects to bond for speculative purposes. There is doubtless greater activity in that line than at any time in the last ten years, and the probability is that more sales will be effected and a greater number of properties developed this season than during all the time we have mentioned. This change is directly attributable to the passage of the Silver bill which has acted like magic in awakening renewed interest in silver mining, as is indicated by the active search for favorable opportunities to invest in properties which would have remained dormant for years to come, but for such favorable legislation in the interest of the white metal.—Journal.

La Blanche Skipped.

The Daily Report of Tuesday says: "A suit was filed in the Justice's Court today by John Furlong against George La Blanche, John Doe Steele and John Doe Holmes, "whose names are not better known to the plaintiff," for 299.99. The plaintiff avers that the defendants obtained from him \$350 for their use and benefit on July 2nd, and that they have wholly failed to return the money or explain why it is withheld.

Three attachments were issued against George La Blanche, on claims for goods sold and delivered.

The facts of the case are that La Blanche was selected as stakeholder in a race where Furlong was backing Dobbins, and before the start skipped to the hills with \$350. The race was not run. On Saturday last the partner of La Blanche offered Furlong the money, but he declined, as he proposes to not only recover, but land the Marine in jail.

COAST NEWS.

Colusa business men talk of inaugurating the cash system.

At Silver Lake, A. T. Sunday a Mexican and his horse were gored to death by a bull.

Edward Hill, a Hot Springs Hotel Stewart, is under arrest at Gilroy and charged with grand larceny.

San Jose grants liquor licenses only when consent of a majority of the people in the neighborhood is obtained and a \$2,000 bond to keep an orderly house is given.

A fire at Tacoma, in the Gandolfo Hotel, Monday, caused a loss of about \$20,000 among several parties, Drayver, the hotel restaurant keeper, being the heaviest loser.

The Anaconda Company and the Montana Union Railroad have fixed up a thirty days trace, and several hundred miners who were laid off Monday will return to work at once.

Albert Hacker killed Harry Bradway at Dog Creek, Fresno county. They were old residents, and the trouble originated in the disputed ownership of certain Government timber land.

A placarded German girl from Baden was found in San Jose Saturday, knowing neither her place of destination nor the names of her friends. She proved to be a niece of ex-Mayor Otto of Gilroy.

Charles F. Parker, an upholsterer of San Francisco, was drowned Sunday afternoon in Donald Slough, near San Mateo. The deceased could not swim, and while bathing slid off the mud bank into deep water.

A young farm laborer named Charles Crown, about twenty-four years of age, was taken to Stockton Sunday night by Constable Dial of Lockeford and locked up on suspicion of being the man who robbed the Mokelumne Hill and Valley Springs stage last week. The evidence is said to be very strong against him.

There was a cloud burst in the foothills of the Santa Rita Mountains A. T. Sunday covering an area of a square mile. The water rushed down the canyon in torrents. A lot of wild animals, such as deer, bears and wolves were caught in its flow. The Schofield ranch was completely devastated of crops, orchards and houses. A large freight team was caught in the flow and carried a mile.
