One thousand clay pigeons have been secured and the boys who were fortunate enough to secure membership can congratulate themselves, as nothing but the best traps will be used to shoot from. American Shooting rules will govern all matches and strict adherence to these rules will carry the club to the front.

Nevada has the best rifle team of ten men in the world, and the wing shots will be as ready to fling the champion standard to the breeze in a few months.

Kemmler Electrocuted.

When the electric current was turned on at 43 1-2 minutes past six yesterday morning there was a sudden convulsion of Kemmler's frame from head to foot. From the lips, which were free to move at will, no sound came forth to suggest that consciousness had lasted more than a small fraction of a second.

When Horses Sleep.

Observant jockeys say that horses usually sleep but two hours out of the twenty-four, and that those hours are from 2 to 4 o'clock A. A Jumping Bean.
