"Well finally the card man insinuated that the cowboy wasn't able to throw a lariat worth a cent and they went at it. The gambler was too much for the other and he finally disembowled him with a single blow of the knife. But the cowboy's friends were bearing down and the gambler seeing them coming took to his heels.

"It was a terrible moment for the cowboy had no lariat. I was a few yards away and I would have given one thousand dollars to have seen a lariat in that fellow's hands for I knew he was a sure throw. When the gambler got about sixty feet away he felt the noose settle about his neck and back he went. A moment more the cowboys were on him and they killed him in a few moments."

"Thought you said the cowboy had no lariat" said one of the crowd.

"So I did boys" said Haines, mixing a little more sugar in his glass. "He grabbed his intestines, yanked them out, wove a running noose like a flash and swinging them round his head made the prettiest throw I ever saw. 
