

JUST IN TIME.

The Salt Lake Tribune sizes up the situation as follows: The practical monetization of silver did not come a moment too soon, judging by the condition of the money market in New York City. Living so long under the shadow of the Temple, the Tribune now and then gets a revelation, and it gave those people notice two years ago that if they did not change their way and do justice to silver, some time when the crisis were to be moved and a great call for money would be made, they would have a panic in New York. 
