

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

The Democrats have adopted a new method of filibustering in the House. When they are brought in to answer a call for a quorum, they answer to their names and immediately sneak out again; so that when the roll is called for a vote the House is a n without a quorum.

Representative Cannon, becoming tired of this sort of thing, offered a resolution reciting the circumstances, and mentioning the names of forty-four members nearly all Democrats, as being guilty, and providing for the immediate revocation of all leaves of absence except in cases of sickness, and notifying the Sergeant at Arms to telegraph the absentees to return at once.

This resolution at once threw the House into the wildest disorder; thirty or forty members were on their feet, yelling at the top of their voices, all at once Representatives Mason of Illinois and Walker of Massachusetts, both good Republicans, are on opposite sides of this lard question, and owing to a remark jokingly made by the latter there was almost a personal encounter; Mr. Mason calling Mr. Walker a blanked liar and making for him to attack him. This was finally quieted and Mr. Mason apologized to his friend, Mr. Walker.

It will not be surprising if the President calls an extra session of Congress, to meet immediately after the November elections. Such a course is considered necessary by a great many Republican Senators and Members, who foresee the trouble there will be in passing the Election bill, the Apportionment bill and the regular appropriation bills at the short session, and who recognize the value of the three weeks which an extra session might make use of before the time for the regular session to meet in December.

Republicans have excellent grounds for asking the people of the country to continue them in control of the House of Representatives. See the important measure which the House has passed at this session; the tariff bill, the silver bill, the Federal election bill, the National bankruptcy bill, the bill relieving the Supreme Court, the bills admitting four new States, the original package bill, the meat inspection bill, the bill against adulterated food, the anti-trust bill, the public land bill and hundreds of minor bills. As soon as the Republicans obtained control of the House the prosperity of the country began to increase, and so it will continue to do as long as they retain that control. These are facts that should not be forgotten.

Last Year and This.

Last year all the cattle ranges were dry and dusty. Little grass was to be found anywhere, not to speak of such as could be mown for hay. This year all the ranges are covered with feed and the valleys with wild hay, but there are few cattle left. They passed in their checks last Winter. On this point the Silver State says: "There are miles of natural meadows above McDermitt where the grass is three feet high. It will not be mowed because there is nothing to eat it. At Wilkenson's ranch, Ten Mile Creek, there is millet loaded with seed and as tall as a man's head."

Should the coming winter bring as much as last we shall next Summer be able to mow a big swath over the whole State of Nevada.
