THE REDUCTION WORKS WIN.

A Decision That Gives Universal Satisfaction.

A dispatch was received in this city yesterday from Reno, to the effect that the case of the Reno Reduction Works vs. the State of Nevada had been decided in favor of the former.

This case has cost the State several thousands of dollars to prosecute and has also put the interested parties on the other side to great expense.

It was also the means of keeping the Reduction Works in the background for some time after its destruction by fire as the owners did not consider it worth while to rebuild until a decision in their favor had been reached in the courts. It is probable that they will be rebuilt now, as the company is assured of the future well-being of everything connected with the same.

COAST NEWS.

John Moff, engineer of the Ontario mine at Park City, Utah, shot and fatally wounded Alexander Langdon, a miner, Saturday. Moff was drinking, and had quarreled with Langdon during the day.

The Fleetwood, a fast passenger steamer plying between Tacoma, Seattle and Olympia, attempted to run on the inside of a lot of logs when leaving Olympia. She struck her nose in and capsized. Nearly all the passengers were thrown into the water, but no one was injured.

A singular accident occurred at Snohomish, Or., the other day. Arthur C. Knight and Giles Hoyle went to the slaughter house to butcher a steer. Hoyle raised his rifle and fired at the animal. The ball glanced from the skull, and striking a knot in a beam above, again glanced, going through the rim of Knight's hat, over the left eye, and ripping up two inches of his scalp. Had he stood an inch further forward he would have been killed.

Nettie Carpenter, the American violinist, has won much notoriety by jilting wealthy George Thirfield, to whom she was to have been married on Wednesday. Her explanation is that she had discovered that she did not love him.

This is a rare instance, when money figures, as the groom generally makes the discovery—after the marriage.

The Geological survey has done some good work in estimating the volume of water at various seasons in the Carson river. The observation station near Benton's ice house is under the supervision of Mr. John Bland, who keeps a careful record of the depth. Within the last month or two the fall has amounted to an inch per day, and if it is found advantageous to control the water, considerable of which is now running to waste, we can expect a series of storage reservoirs by the Fall of next year.


