THE HOLMES DISTRICT.

James Yerington has High Hopes of a Successful Future for that Camp.

Pr sperity seems to have struck this lively camp in a lump, and from all appearances it has come to stay. Superintendent James Yerington in an interview with an APPEAL reporter yesterday said: "There is every evidence of this section being one of the best in the State of Nevada. The deposits of ore at present in sight indicate that better material is to come and higher assays than ever will be the result."

The present owners are thoroughly satisfied that a bonanza is in sight and intend to develop it as soon as possible. In the Can delaria and Belleville mills now in full blast, the metal is being turned out bar after bar by a large force of men working night and day. Some 100 miners find employment at that point and better prospects appear daily.

This is a grand improvement on the last few years when silver dropped down to an exceedingly low rate only to be brought back to its present value by the Republican party.

Col. J. W. Sutherland, Col. Lake and Capt. Hulse passed through to San Francisco yesterday where they go to interest themselves in the matter. Mr. Fitzgerald took the Lake Tahoe route and join his associates at the Bay.

Nevada's chief product is once more winning its almost lost prestige and there is a lively boom for the State gathering its forces to help reclaim its fallen population.


