COAST NEWS.

Death of D. R. Culp.

About 2:30 o'clock Thursday morning, D. R. Culp, an old resident of this city, died at his residence. Though his health has been poor for some time, death was not looked for so suddenly, and it is a sad blow to his wife and children.

Deceased was a quiet, pleasant gentleman, and a kind father and husband. He was for many years foreman of the V. & T. paint shop, and a good citizen.

He was a member of Carson Lodge No. 1, F. and A. M., and Ormsby Lodge No. 4, A. O. U. W. It is said he was insured for \$7,000.

Tunnelling New York Bay.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—There is a scheme for tunnelling New York bay, a bill for which has been introduced at Washington in the House, explaining the gigantic affair. It is expected the tunnel will cost at the rate of \$1,250,000 per mile, or \$6,000,000. The purpose is to connect the great trunk lines terminating at Jersey City with Brooklyn. There is supposed to be a connection between the scheme and the plan for a European steamship line to stop at Montauk Point and not come to New York City.


