MONEY IN ELECTIONS.

Shameless Corruption in Both Parties.

The Chronicle is agitating the question of bribery and corruption in the recent election. It talks of having men indicted who purchased votes in Virginia City.

The Chronicle assumes that nobody but Republicans bought votes, when everybody knows that the shameless situation presented itself of both sides bidding for the votes of the miserable riff raff element, whose suffrage is put up at auction every two years.

The APPEAL has no objection to seeing this question of bribery on election day fully ventilated.

The sellers and the purchasers of votes ought all to lie together in the same jail.

There is a stringent law on the statute books regarding this offense, but it is a dead letter. It is the acme of hypocrisy to have such a law on the statute books, for nobody fears it.

It is useless to cover this matter up and laugh about it, it is disgraceful and infamous, and if a few examples were made—of both parties, mind you—of the men who purchase the votes, and the monied men behind them who furnish the sack, were all indicted and sent to the penitentiary, it would be a blessed day for the State and a cold day for the miserable vermin whose votes are openly for sale at elections.

The Australian ballot is the thing to remedy this evil. In the last legislature a Republican Senate passed a bill adopting the Australian system, and then reconsidered the step it had taken in the interests of reform, and reconsidering the bill, killed it.

Their action was suspicious and cowardly, and an admission that the party could not win under a system that permitted every man to vote uninfluenced.

If those who voted to reconsider can give any other reasons for changing front on the question we would like to hear from them.

If the Republican party cannot stand the Australian ballot in Nevada it had better give way to some party that can.

The APPEAL, however, does not agree with certain politicians in this State who fear that the party cannot win under this system. We believe it has a majority in the State when the vote and count is absolutely secret and fair.

But if such be not the case, in common with every lover of fair play in the Republican party, ought to be willing to abide by the consequences.

The Australian ballot bill ought to be the first bill passed by the next session of the legislature.

They Won't Spawn.

Mr. Close who has been engaged in assisting Fish Commissioner Mills in the propagation of the finned tribe in Nevada went to Marlette lake last week and secured for female trout in order to secure their spawn. Some thousand fish were secured and placed where they were supposed to be safe.

Sunday brought a change in the program and a detachment of fishermen arrived upon the scene. When they struck the pool where the fish were, all hands threw their hats into the air and began to scoop them out by the amfull. This work went on until 500 had been secured, after which the sports staggered off under their load toward Carson. When they got here each man had a long story to tell about how fast he had to bait his hook, and also go into details regarding the number that got away.

Close is not treating his friends on the result of his trip, and will probably take steps to have the crowd jailed.

AFTER THE LOTTERY.

The U. S. Marshal will Do his Duty at Every Turn.

U. S. Marshal James Moore, who was in the city yesterday, has received instructions from Washington to keep his eyes open and "copper" all violators of the Lottery Law.

His directions are to bring them before the Grand Jury and prosecute to the full extent of the law.

Under the head of "violators" are found church raffles, drawing games, etc., and the prime mover, in this struggle to uphold morality, the Secretary of the Interior, makes no distinction in favor of any religious organization. They must all bend under the ban of law alike, and lead a pure, square game existence.

Any person who attends church fairs and frantically endeavors to purchase raffle tickets in sewing machines, crazy quilts and tea sets, will be jailed and immediately attended to.

The APPEAL advises our "leading citizens" to throw away their tickets for the November drawing in both Little and big Louisiana in order to make room in their inside pockets for Chautauqua tracks and American journals on social reform.

I commend to my fellow citizens the privilege of remembering the poor, the homeless and the sorrowful. Let us endeavor to merit the promised recompense of charity and gracious acceptance of our praise.
