

STANFORD AND MURPHY.

For once in his career Leland Stanford has encountered a very determined man.

Patrick Murphy, who was once a California State Senator, and for many years a newspaper writer, was again nominated by the people of his district as a reward for the conscientious, honest work he had performed for them.

He was beaten in his district by a man named Maloney, and he has gone into court charging that said Maloney's election was the result of large sums of money spent by Leland Stanford, a candidate for U. S. Senator.

Judge Finn has granted his petition in which he asks that he be allowed to produce Leland Stanford in court and perpetuate his testimony.

The allegations made by Mr. Murphy concerning Senator Stanford's connection with the election are virtually the same as those made in his late petition before Judge Wallace, viz., that Leland Stanford and his agents and employes were guilty of not only stuffing the precinct registers and the ballot boxes, but of also buying votes.

The APPEAL does not believe that Mr. Stanford will ever appear in Court, and if he does he will not answer the questions put to him.

Once before he was in a tight place of this kind, and when asked directly if he had not bribed members of the Legislature, he refused to answer, and Justice Field decided that he need not.

It will be the same thing over again, but if he again takes refuge behind Field or any other Judge, it will kill whatever chances he may have had for a place on the Presidential ticket.

No one who knows Mr. Murphy will ever charge him with having any desire to extort money from Stanford. He merely wants to show the people of California something of the man who secures political honors by nefarious methods.

Stanford will find Murphy a very live man in a fight of this kind.
