THE NEW GOLD DISCOVERY.

The "Courier" Gives an Extended Account of the Find.

The new gold discovery in Douglas which was mentioned in yesterday's APPEAL, is thus described by the Genoa Courier of yesterday:

For years the fine float gold along the East Fork of the Carson river has attracted the attention of prospectors but only a few have found gold enough to remunerate them for their labor. Prospectors have scanned the hills from the place where the Carson river emerges from the mountains up as far as Silver Mountain in a vain effort to find the fountain head—the main ledge from which the float gold is supposed to have come. It was something like a year ago that Marshall Willard told this writer that he had his eye on a spot that he believed would lead to the coveted ledge. Mr. Willard was in the Courier office Tuesday and gave a full statement of his discovery. As he tells it, about two years ago, in company with his partner, J. K. McDonald, and Orson West came down the river and camped at Horse Shoe Bend. At that point Mr. Willard prospected the croppings of a ledge and out of twenty-two horns taken from different places across the ledge he got twenty good prospects.

A short time ago Mr. Willard made further prospects and interested over twenty people in the Valley who joined with him in locating eleven claims, which takes in a scope of three miles along the river, Horse Shoe Bend being the center. Mr. Willard describes the ledge as running 15 degrees east of south and 15 degrees west of north, the croppings show it to be from eighteen to twenty feet wide on the surface, and lying back of a lime formation which contains traces of quartz. The ledge matter consists of iron and quartz mixed, and he believes it will be considerably decomposed when depth is attained. The river cuts entirely through the ledge in places and shaves it at other points. Wherever the river has exposed the ledge, signs of placer mining can be seen a short distance below. The rock closely resembles the croppings at the Willard & McDonald mine which has been worked with great success.

Mr. Willard states that the lay of the country is such that drift from the lower end of the ledge would naturally wash out across Mr. H. Springmeyer's land where a prospect was found a year ago last May that caused a flurry of excitement and the location of a number of placer claims. It is his belief that the black sand and gold found on the ditch at that time came from this ledge. In a few days men will commence work under the direction of Mr. Willard to cut through the ledge in several places for the purpose of ascertaining the value of the ore.

If a large body of ore, that will even work a few dollars to the ton has been discovered right at the door of this unlimited water-power, it will make Carson Valley one of the liveliest places on the Coast.

KEHOE'S SCOOP.

He Secures a Wife and Avoids a Fight.

The disappearance of Kehoe the fighter, who left the Comstock with a buxom widow is still the talk of that locality. McCormack of this city who when he last fought Kehoe lost the fight on an alleged foul, has been in training to again challenge Kehoe and he proposed to make him fight or leave the State. Kehoe from his experience with McCormack knew that his jig was up if he ever met him again and that his reign as a fake pugilist was over in Virginia City the day he consented. About the time he was casting about for a new place to gull the public he found a widow whom the Order of Workingmen had just paid \$2,000 on her husband's life insurance and taking the widow and the money he disappeared. Kehoe was bounced from the California Athletic Club for foul fighting and it now believed that he paid all the men who ever met him a certain sum to loose while he and his friends made big money in betting. Kehoe came to the Comstock ragged, but by shrewd manipulations of his pretended fights has cleaned up several thousand from the gullible people of Virginia City.

Presentation Night.

Last night's distribution of medals, won by the Carson Guards at annual shoot Sunday last, was a memorable event in the history of the Company. The boys in blue with good scores opposite their names stepped up blushing to the front and received their trophies. Among these eagle eyed marksmen was found the only Sergt. On the reverse side was a highly colored picture of a satisfied soldier and a dead horse. Howls of applause went up from the boys and Frank is now trying to mortgage his wood-wagon to treat the squad. The medal is the work of County Clerk Wm. Hy. Doane, and is one of the best executed fakes you ever saw.

After the distribution a good old time social hop was indulged in and every last one of the guards proved himself as efficient with his toes as his gun.

Terrible Death.

Several days ago William Robinson, a miner was killed in a snow-slide on the mountains, south of Lundy about one and a half miles. Jacob Werner, his companion, was found alive. Both legs and one arm were crushed by the timber and they were frozen almost to the body by the cold. He was sensible when found and said he thought he had been so confined for five days. During that time he had gotten hold of a hand-saw and, while trying to free himself from it the timbers had nearly sawed the frozen arm from his body without feeling it. He died before he was taken to the foot of the mountains.
