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THE TRUE BUSINESS.

Wipe Out the Ignorance and Corruptable Voting Element.

The Virginia Enterprise publishes the following:

It would be hard to find an intelligent man in Nevada who will not frankly admit that, in his opinion, the man who has been here long enough to acquire the right to vote and is still unable to read and write in English is not worthy of citizenship.

Any one, native or foreign born, who is too indolent to learn to read his own ticket and to write his own name, or the name of a friend, will make a poor citizen and worse voter, and should such be disfranchised by an election law securing absolute secrecy in voting nobody will pity him. No modification of the Australian ballot system thoroughly secures this secrecy and guarantees against illegitimate influence or corruption of voters if provision is made for the assistance of those who assert their inability to intelligently mark their own tickets. With the privilege of calling for assistance left with the purchasable voter such a supervision may be exercised over the ballots of those who will sell their manhood as would enable agents of unscrupulous candidates to partially defeat the object of the law.

To leave no gap through which purchasers may observe the delivery of their bargains, it will be necessary to omit provision for instruction to illiterate voters, and some who oppose the Australian system may attempt to have a secret election law declared unconstitutional should one be so framed that the ignorant man may claim that he is unable to vote. While the Court would probably not hold that the Constitution is violated in such a case any more than in the case of an invalid who cannot go to the polls, the Legislature can prevent trouble by submitting an amendment to the section of the Constitution relative to the right of suffrage by inserting the words "who can read and write in English," after the words "male citizen." An educational qualification is a good thing with or without the Australian system, and the expediency of preparing for one now will doubtless be seen by the incoming Legislature in its efforts to make its work as perfect as possible.

The above forcibly argues a proposition which has been long advocated by the APPEAL.

The disgrace which has come upon our State and the title of "Rotten Borough," which hurts our business standing in the East, is due to the wholesale purchase of a class of venal, ignorant voters who swarm about the polls on election day, waiting to sell to the highest bidder.

No one will deny that at least four fifths of the purchasable class are men unable to read and write the English language.

By disfranchising this wretched class of scoundrels, it will cost both parties about half as much to make a campaign as now, and the disgraceful methods resorted to on election day, will be a thing of the past.


