A Bouquet of Brilliant Engagements by Manager Piper.

The Enterprise furnishes the following:

John Piper, the veteran theatrical manager, who owns the Virginia, Carson and Reno Opera Houses, has dates as follows: Lotta, Virginia, January 24.

Eonice Goodrich will play at Carson January 26, 27, 28; at Virginia January 29, 30, 31, and February 1, 2, 3 and 4; Reno, February 5, 6 and 7. This is a popular-price affair, presenting comedy and drama.

The Opera Company will appear at Carson February 6 and in Virginia February 7.

Goodyear, Elicht & Schillina's Minstrels will play in Virginia February 9 and 10; Carson, February 11, and Reno February 12.

"The Clemenceau Case," with the great understudy, Sybil Johnson, at the head, will hold the boards in Reno-February 13 and in Virginia on the 14th. Owing to the proverbial modesty of the legislators the company will not play in Carson.

Joseph Grismer and Phoebe Davies will play in Reno February 19; in Virginia February 20, 21 and 22, and in Carson February 23 and 24.

The Boston Comic Opera Company play in Virginia for one week commencing March 2, and will appear in Carson March 9, 10 and 11; Reno March 12, 13 and 14.

Valuable Invention.

Though it is not generally known, the high price of champagne is caused by the breaking of large quantities of bottle by the pressure of the gas when the liquor is in process of fermentation. The overcoming of this breakage means that the price of Roderer and other standard brands will be about one half the present cost, and place the delicious beverage within the reach of all; even editors.

The problem has at last been solved by Oliver Roberts, who has invented a combination cork and safety valve. The valve tube goes directly through the cork; at the top on the outside, is a spring valve, so constructed that when the inside pressure becomes too great for the bottle to bear, the valve lifts allowing "steam" to escape until the pressure is relieved, when the valve is closed again by the spring, which shuts up the opening air tight, and the quality of the wine is not in the least impaired.

It took months of patient experimenting to perfect the invention, and nearly twelve cases of champagne were rendered worthless in the undertaking.

Mr. Roberts has applied for a patent, and a good deal of credit is due him for his energy and perseverance in the work.

Finding of a Dead Man.

An Indian arrived yesterday afternoon with a letter from Charles Symonds at Pyramid, 50 miles north, which stated that the same Indian had just reported to Symonds that he had, in lonely canyon eight miles from Symonds' place, found the body of a dead man. Upon that report Symonds sent the Indian here to pilot Coroner Peers to the spot, and he left this morning to go there and bring the body in.—Gazette.

If it is discovered that the man was killed by Indians, something is liable to drop.

COAST NEWS.

G. H. Oury, ex-delegate to Congress from Arizona, died Monday at Tucson, aged sixty-six years.

Time has been granted Olsen, charged with the murder of Ivet in Merced in which to plead to the information filed against him.

The property of the defunct Los Angeles Tribune sold for \$1,300. The press was not bid on. Not enough was realized to pay the printers and reporters.

Colonel J. M. Eddy, General Manager and receiver of the International and Great Northern Railroad, died at Pasadena Monday morning of hemorrhage of the lungs.

The Coroner's inquest in the case of Marie Forgous, who was shot by her husband August Forgous, at Sacramento, has found a verdict charging Forgous with murder.

Two persons registered at the Cosmopolitan Hotel at Bakersfield as Mr. and Mrs. Lewis of El Paso, Texas, committed suicide by shooting themselves in the head Monday.

While men were discharging the cargo of canned salmon of the steamer Danube at Victoria, B. C., Monday, the piles under the wharf gave way, throwing men and cargo into the water underneath. Four men are known to have been killed.

The March of Irrigation.

The Biggs Argus says: The Fleming canal, now in process of construction, will divert a large quantity of irrigation water at a point about four miles south of Oroville. The ditch will work a grand development for that part of Butte county, and thousands of acres of land hitherto used for cereal growing purposes will be made to grow the finest of alfalfa and all the fruits that can be grown in any other portion of the State. Land for miles in extent from the Buttes in Sutter county will soon be under irrigation and enhanced in value millions of dollars.

Violating the 12-o'clock Law.

Sheriff Botsford arrested John P. Sweeney Tuesday night for violating the 12 o'clock law in keeping his saloon open and conducting gambling games after 12 o'clock on Saturday night. Sweeney immediately gave bonds, was released from custody and his trial set for 1 o'clock yesterday.

In consequence of the absence of General Clark, Sweeney's attorney, the case was continued until the 22d instant.




