The Meat Market.

The *Reno Gazette* has the following:

The beef market gives indications of better prices in the near future. A well-known San Francisco butcher told a *Gazette* reporter yesterday that if he had money he would have no hesitancy in putting it into beef cattle at the present prices and holding them for a raise. He said that Arizona had but about 10,000 fat steers left and that only about 6,000 of them would find their way into the San Francisco market, as Los Angeles, San Diego and the surrounding country would use fully 4,000. He also said that good beef was getting very scarce in California and the most of it was rough meat at best, and that it would be May before grass beef would come in.

Destroying Insects.

Dispatches report great destruction in the pine forests of Bavaria by the Nonnen, the caterpillar of a certain moth which at intervals has appeared in vast numbers in Europe. The creatures are eaten by birds and by wasps and other insects, but the most effective destroyer has been found to be an air exhauster operated near a powerful electric light. The moths are attracted by the light, and a strong exhaust current of air drawn into a huge funnel sucks them into an underground chamber where they are effectually buried. A similar destruction in East Prussia in 1853 is said to have been relieved by a great storm, from which they were afterward thrown up as a huge bank several miles long.

Dempsey Defeated.

Jack Dempsey, the ex-nonpariel, was easily defeated at New Orleans Wednesday night, by Robert Fitzsimmons, of New Zealand, in thirteen rounds. Upwards of half a million dollars is known to have changed hands on the result. This makes Fitzsimmons the middle-weight champion of the world.
