FIFTEENTH SESSION.

SENATE.

Senate met at 11 o'clock. President Pougade presiding. Roll called. All Senators present except Williams of Ormsby.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. H. Jones. Journal read and approved.

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE. Committee on Enrollment reported S. J. M. Res. No. 8 as correctly enrolled.

Committee on Engraving reported S. B's Nos. 26 29 34 and 36 as correctly engrossed.

Humboldt delegation reported favorably on A. B. No. 23.

Messages from Governor transmitting certain communications. A so that he had approved S. J. M. and Res. No. 8. Also transmitting report of Adjutant General which was referred to Committee on Military affairs.

Senate met at 2 o'clock. Quorum present.

Special order—S. B. 36, Providing the canvassing of the vote on Constitutional Convention. Motion to lay on table, lost. Motion to refer to Committee on Ways and Means, carried. Moved that Ways and Means report bill back to Senate to-morrow. Lost, 6 to 15.

Special order—S. B. No. 34 at 2:30 P. M.

After a long and bitter parliamentary fight the bill was passed. Emmitt gave notice of motion to reconsider.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

By Nicholls—A. B. No. 43. To prevent the sale of diseased meat etc. Trade and Manufacture.

By Nixon—A. B. No. 44, To provide for the election of district judges and establish their pay. The provisions of the bill are substantially as follows: The State is to be divided into four Judicial Districts.

The first comprises the following counties, each of which is to pay the amount set opposite. Storey \$2,748.50; Ormsby \$1,092; Douglas \$471.80; Esmeralda \$800 and Lyon, \$800. The second district comprises the following. Washoe \$2,223; Churchill \$261 and Humboldt \$1,516. The third district comprises Nye, \$579; Lander \$1,378.50, and Eureka, \$2,942.50. The fourth district comprises Elko \$2,823; White Pine \$777 and Lincoln \$400. As will be seen from the above, the Judge of the First District will receive \$6,000, and the other three \$4,000 each. The first election is to take place in 1894, and the term is to be four years except in cases to fill unexpired term.

The bill was referred to the com-

mittee on counties and County Boundaries.

By Trembath—A. C. R. No. 24 Amending Sec. Three of Article One of the Constitution. The change made is to include criminal as well as civil cases. Referred to Joint Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

By Bell—A. B. No. 45—Providing for the purchase of specimens of gold bearing quartz for the State Cabinet. Appropriates \$100 per annum. Ways and Means.

SECOND READING OF BILLS. S. B. 11—Miller's Forty Days' session bill, to take effect April 1, 1891. Judiciary.

GENERAL FILE AND THIRD READING. George—A. O. No. 41. Act providing for incorporation of railroads.

S. B. No. 22—Providing for the back pay of Ex-Gov. Frank Bell. House resolved its if into Committee of the Whole for its consideration.

Bell in the chair. Murphy spoke of the bill, and recommended that it be cut down some \$400.

Bicknell spoke on the subject and said that it was a just bill and should be paid.

Allen, Gignoux, Trembath and McClellan agreed with Murphy while Thompson argued in behalf of Bell.

McClellan—Resolution reducing the amount \$1,111.21 to \$416.67 the amount actually paid out by Ex Gov. Bell according to law.

Murphy moved to amend the amendment to \$670.81. Both amendments were lost and the Committee reported the bill back without recommendation either way. The bill is made a special order for Tuesday at 2:30, P. M.

Recess taken until 2 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

GENERAL FILE AND THIRD READING. A. C. R. 21, which was special order, was taken up and passed by a vote of 27 to 10; three absent.

Message from the Senate A. B. 23, Granting leave of absence to Assessor Guthrie of Humboldt Co.

S. B. 26—Fixing number of attaches and salaries thereof. Message was received through the Governor, from the legislature of Illinois thanking the various states for the interest manifested in the World's Columbian Exposition.

Message from Secretary State. A. B. No. 168, which was vetoed by Gov. Stevenson, was presented and the veto sustained by unanimous vote. The bill refers to some trifling duties of the Serge at-Arms.

Unfinished Business. The Assembly refused to take up from the table Leeper's A. B. No. 30, regarding the practice of dentistry. Adjourned at 2:25.
