ARBOR DAY.

Remarks by a Practical Tree Planter.

It will be Arbor Day April 3d. I plant nursery trees 'till May 20th. I went below Dayton in May, 15 years ago and dug cottonwood trees which I used for fence posts. The trees were in full leaf; I sawed the top off and planted deep, and every tree lived. A year ago the tops of these trees were cut off for wood, corded and correctly measured, and it gave at the rate of 40 cords to the acre, leaving the body of the tree 9 feet high and 18 inches through, with 40 trees to the acre, the trunks of which should be added to the 40 cords. It is considered that the forest will be exhausted in 15 years. Ten acres planted to cottonwood or poplar in 15 years, would give 400 cords, which at \$6 per cord would be worth \$2,400, leaving the body of the tree to give an other supply of limbs in about the same time, besides affording a pasture for calves or sheep. Elm trees do well in Nevada. I have been asked about planting trees on the street from Rail's store to the Race track. I told John Kersey that I would stand in. I will furnish the trees at 25 cents each that sell for 50 cents. I consider this donation equal to one half the supply.

A good idea for ranches is to plant 20 acres to fruit, which, besides the fruit, the \$2,000 per year profit on the fruit alone, would give five wood enough when trimmed, to supply the farm.

FIFTEENTH SESSION.

SENATE.

Senate met at 11 o'clock. President Poujade presiding. Roll called. All Senators present except Rickey and Williams of Ormsby.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Bird.

The Journal was read until that part in relation to Constitutional Amendments, when on Motion of Williamson, that part of the Journal was skipped. The motion made on Wednesday that Amendment be not spread on Journal was reconsidered.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.
 Engrossment—S. B. 80, correctly engrossed.

Agriculture—S. B. 53, with recommendation that it be referred to Joint Committee on Irrigation. Ways & Means—S. B. 78, and A. B. 62, without recommendation. Enrollment—S. B.'s 30 and 60, as correctly enrolled.

Judiciary—S. B. 85, favorably. Special—S. B. 16, amended ordered re-engrossed.

MESSAGES.

From Assembly, returning S. B. 73, which had been lost; also S. B. 49, which had passed; also presenting A. B.'s 69 and 76; also returning A. B. 33, the Assembly having refused Amendment increased Supreme Judges salary \$4,500 to \$5,000. On motion of S. rouble, the Senate receded from its amendment, by a vote of 12 to 4.

Introduction—By Kaiser S. B. 89, In relation levying taxes Com. on Ways & Means.

A. B. 25, Allowing the distribution of Statutes to public schools. Passed.

S. B. 70, Repealing 12 o'clock law in all counties except Storey, Washoe and Ormsby. Passed 14 to 4.

A. B. 38, Provides that no school District shall exceed 16 miles square. Passed.

The Senate Con. Res., twenty-two, in number were here read. All referred to Committee of the Whole.

Recess until 1:30.

A. B. 74, The 75 paged Revenue Bill consumed two hours and a quarter in its reading. Chief Clerk A. C. Pratt was courteously spelled or relieved by William P. Hayes of Storey, and George S. Nixon of Humboldt.

The bill passed by unanimous vote. Absent Hughes, Leeper, McFadden and Sexton.

After 30 minutes filibustering the House adjourned at 4:30 until 10 A. M.

MCHARDY VINDICATED.

An Allen who Went to the Legislature.

At the last session of the Legislature there was a contest between G. W. McHardy and Geo. Dickson.

McHardy claimed that Dickson had never been naturalized and was a native of Scotland. The case came up before a Legislative committee and though the evidence was quite positive that Dickson was not a citizen, he was given the seat, the Committee holding that the only evidence it would accept of Dickson's nativity would be the birth registry.

Dickson on cross examination swore that he was born Dec. 1st, 1853, in New York. He once acknowledged that he was born in Peebles, Scotland, and after McHardy was defeated he sent to Peebles, Scotland and obtained a certified copy of the birth certificate which reads:

George, son of Andrew Dixon fletcher and of Mary his spouse, born Dec. 1st, 1853 in the Parish of Peebles, County of Peebles, Scotland, etc.

Dickson kept a butcher shop in Austin where he advertised his business and spelled his name Dixon, but afterwards changed it to Dickson. There is considerable other evidence to show that Dickson was born in Scotland. If the person mentioned in the birth record is the one who contested McHardy's seat, an example should be made of the man who has held office in this State while yet an alien.

There is a relief bill before the Legislature giving McHardy \$175 for his expenses in contesting the seat. To this should also be added the salary of the office he was kept out of.
