The surface of the water is now 52 feet (vertically) below the floor of the 1600 station, the water having been lowered 9 feet during the week.

Death of Senator Williamson's Son. J. R. Williamson, Jr. son of Senator Williamson, of Lander county, who has been ill for several days with pneumonia, despite the efforts of his physicians, died yesterday forenoon. Deceased was an only son, and just attained majority. He was a bright and estimable young man, and honored and respected by his acquaintances. A Two Million Dollar Fire. New York, March 17.—The fire that started this evening in the nine-story block on Blecker and Green streets, destroyed it, and three buildings adjacent. The fire was hard to get under control. The losses aggregate \$2,000,000.


