This has been a proud week for Secretary Blaine First, the Brazilian mails brought to the State department copies of the official proclamation of the President of Brazil promulgating the reciprocity treaty with the United States and authorizing the entry of all goods mentioned therein on and after April 1st. Of course this was not news to Mr. Blaine, but nothing short of the official documents would convince the "doubting Thomas" who busied themselves in circulating rumors of the rejection of the treaty by the Brazilian government and others quite as senseless. But the most important event, an event which places Mr. Blaine among the most foremost modern masters of diplomacy, was the receipt of a dispatch from Lord Salisbury, the head of the British foreign office, agreeing on the part of his government to accept Mr. Blaine's proposition to submit the questions in dispute between the two governments, relating to Behring Sea, to arbitration. This is a great triumph, and what is the most pleasing thing about it, it was accomplished by a dignified statement of our claims, without the least shadow of bluster. As Secretary of State, Mr. Blaine has pleased his friends and confounded his enemies, and now we shall hear no more of his trying to get this country into a war with England.
