Senator Comins' R. R. Bill.

This is how the White Pine News regards the R. R. Bill.

What we publish in full to-day, is a measure that has called forth comment pro and con. Some see in it a scheme for the benefit of a few people who, having secured a charter, will dispose of it to the highest bidder for their own personal aggrandizement. Others, who have closely watched the progress of the bill from its introduction to its final passage, believe it to be a bona fide measure in the interest of the people of the State. We have conversed with some persons who claim to be well posted on the measure and they assured us it was drawn and rushed through the Legislature in the interest of the people. People became suspicious at the late day of the session in which it was brought forward and the unnecessary haste of its promoters to rush it through. Its friends claim this was necessary to prevent the Central Pacific people from strangling the measure if time was given to marshal their forces in opposition to it. One thing is certain, White Pine county will not be lifted out of the mire until it gets a railroad. This is its only salvation, and our representatives who worked with a will to put this measure through have as much interest at stake in the county as any of our citizens. We believe, and shall continue to believe, until it is proven to the contrary, that Senate Bill 88 is for the public welfare. We also learned, though not from any of the promoters of the measure, that the Atchison and Santa Fe people are at the back of this new railroad scheme. If the road is built, well and good, and its promoters will receive the thanks of their constituents. If it fails to materialize it cannot injure us any way. This is how we look at it.
