CIRCULATING MONEY.

The Way it is Done Fully Explained.

An Arizona paper published the following:

Free coinage means that every man having 100 ounces of silver may take or send it to the mint and get it coined. He will then have in his pocket \$120. He is a miner and has dug that silver out of the ground. While he was digging it out the grocer sold him flour, sugar, coffee, tea, salt, etc., to the value of \$40.
