

WHAT WE MIGHT DO.

The Gazette prints the following: It is pretty generally the case that the men who are constantly using the over production argument are those who never produced anything in their lives. In many cases we think they use the "argument" more to hear themselves talk than for any other purpose, and do not believe they actually fear an over production of anything that goes to make a State prosperous or a people happy. Say, for instance, Nevada produced two hundred thousand dollars' worth of good bacon and ham, does anyone pretend to say that our merchants would not handle it in preference to sending abroad for Eastern meats? And by way of parenthesis we will add that it takes that much for home consumption. Will any one pretend to say that there can be an over production of eggs or poultry with California, Oregon, Arizona and Washington looking to the Eastern markets to supply them with those necessities? Will anybody have the gall to assert that two hundred thousand tons of Nevada potatoes could not be sold annually if a market was sought for in the great cities of the East? But first let us supply ourselves with these things before we consider the over-production question; it will be time enough to take up and solve that proposition when there actually is over-production at home. Nevada beef, mutton and wool are sought for from all points of the compass and there has not been an over production as yet, nor will there ever be, and transportation companies are willing and indeed anxious to haul them to the markets of the world. If a community produces an article that is used and in demand they can always find a market for it. California's small fruit is in demand all through the East at good prices, but Nevada discounts her in growing mealy spuds, apples, honey and hay. We are in our swaddling clothes and do not know what is in store for us until we get in and battle for our products in the marts of the world. Let the people who are using the over production argument produce something and see if they find any difficulty in selling it before they paint a picture in such dark colors.

A Bandit Hunter Dead.

Stephen Venard died in the County Hospital at Nevada City California on the 20th instant, aged 68 years. May 15th, 1855, the North San Juan stage was stopped near Nevada City by George Shanks, alias Jack Williams, Bob Finn, and George W. Moore, who captured \$7,900. Venard, who participated in the chase a few hours later, came up with the highwaymen in one of the wildest and most inaccessible portions of South Yuba Canyon, where they were dividing the spoils. An encounter ensued, in which Venard, with a rifle, killed all three and escaped unhurt. Governor Low appointed him Lieutenant Colonel on his staff for meritorious services in the field, and the Wells, Fargo Express Company presented him with a valuable rifle.

The Break in Stocks.

The San Francisco Post says the recent decline in Con. Virginia, which carried the whole line down with it, was due wholly to inside manipulation. The merit of the property is beyond question. There has been a rumor in Pine street that the Jones crowd inaugurated a strong bear movement in order to cover a long line of shorts in lower figures. 


