SILVER COINAGE.

The Result of a Meeting of the Cabinet.

The Cabinet meeting called to consider the financial question was attended by Secretaries Foster, Tracy, Noble, Rusk and Postmaster General Wannamaker. Secretaries Blaine and Proctor and Attorney-General Miller were absent and their departments were not represented. The questions discussed were the coinage of silver, and issuance of 41-per-cent bonds, and the form of the Treasury asset and liability statement.

Secretary Foster made the following statement as the result of the action of the cabinet meeting with reference to the coinage of silver: "After full consideration of the law relating to the coinage of silver, Secretary Foster finds that the Act of March 3, 1891, requires that the Secretary of the Treasury shall as soon as practicable coin trade dollars and bars into silver dollars. He also finds that \$151,000 was appropriated for the recoinage of subsidiary silver coin into such denominations as will best serve to give it circulation. There is a constant demand for small coins, principally dimes, which the mints have not been able to supply. The Secretary of the Treasury decided that his first duty in this matter in this matter is to obey the directions of Congress.

Congress ordered the coinage of trade-dollar bars in silver dollars. The coinage of trade-dollar bars in this manner will transform what costs \$5,087,795 into \$5,128,281 standard dollars.

The Secretary finds that it will require perhaps four months to perform the work of coining trade dollar bars into standard dollars and recoinage subsidiary silver. Therefore the question of the continued coinage of silver dollars as heretofore is not a practicable one at present.

The Candelaria Shooting

A gentleman who came in last evening from Candelaria says that the sensational dispatches published about the shooting being the result of the wounded man being intimate with Mrs. Booth, have no foundation in fact.

It appears that Beatty advanced money to allow Mrs. Booth to leave the town after she had quarreled with her husband.

He scarcely knew Mrs. Booth, and only advanced the money on the security of two persons who were friends of Mrs. Booth.

Beatty will recover.

On Wednesday Booth had a hearing before Justice Howard. He was found guilty of assault with intent to kill, and was bound over to appear before the Grand Jury with bail fixed at \$2500.
