

Nevada Census.

According to the last census bulletin the following is the present population of the six principal cities of Nevada:

Winnemucca	1,037	763

Virginia City has decreased 22 per cent., Carson 6 per cent., Eureka 61 per cent., Austin 27 per cent., Tuscarora 15 per cent. Winnemucca shows the only increase and Carson the smallest decrease. Reno is not mentioned in the list.

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
