These are instructions that have been sent to a number of Carson people within the past few days, with the most alluring letters regarding green goods which are now on sale. 'I have a very superior article of the kind,' says Eaton, "in fact the best ever issued or put on the market; the sizes run from one to twenty. I warrant each and every note to be perfect as to paper, coloring, vignette, printing, engraving and signatures, and when made to appear as having been used or handled much, I defy the best bank clerk or expert to tell them from the genuine."

"When you come here I will show you my entire stock from \$1 to \$100,000. Compare them with the genuine, and in fact submit them to any test you see fit, before you pay me a single dollar, then after you are thoroughly satisfied on every point, you can select whatever sizes you want and pay cash for your purchase, and carry the goods home with you.

There is no wrong in it; Uncle Sam has millions of our money locked up in the Treasury, uselessly and unjustly so. I know that you have some distance to come, but considering the tremendous profits and no risks whatsoever, it is well worth the slight inconvenience of a journey here.

My terms are \$300 for \$3000, \$450 for \$6000, \$700 for \$10,000, and \$20,000 costs \$1200. Three thousand dollars for \$300 is the very smallest amount I sell under any circumstances."

Charley Wilson on Deck

At the recent Fireman's Convention in Portland, Charley Wilson of the U. S. Mint was a conspicuous figure.

In the report printed in the Oregonian, the following appears:

Now another consultation was necessary, and the Americans were granted the privilege of submitting their defence in writing, to be read at a public meeting, the date of which was fixed for the following evening. In the interim there was to be no hostile demonstration on either side. At the appointed hour the rickety shake building was again filled to its utmost capacity, and just as the written defence was about being read, Charles Wilson, one of the American leaders, clad in a red shirt, pants, (a little worse for wear) stuck in his boots, and a shockingly bad hat, requested permission to make a few remarks.

Wilson had in early days of San Francisco been an alderman and subsequently a supervisor of that city, and during that period had frequently mollified mobs of greater or lesser numbers by a logical, if not altogether eloquent, line of argument.

Wilson made one of the very liveliest speeches of the session and, while he did not pay much attention to the flowers of rhetoric, put his ideas in plain, terse shape, and his speech was cheered to the echo.

Affairs in Chili.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The following telegram has been received by Don Pedro Montt, the representative of the Chilean Insurgents here:

Iquique, Chili, July 15.—The only combat that has taken place has been between our vanguard and the rear-guard of the Dictator's army to the south of Vallenar. In the combat the troops of the Dictator fled and our troops occupy the whole Province of Atacama.

Another dispatch was received to the effect that his army is still receiving arms from Europe, that they are splendidly disciplined and enthusiastic, receiving volunteers daily. Supplies are arriving daily.

A San Diego dispatch says Balmaceda's troops resources are constantly diminishing, and there is discontent in the Dictator's army. The sailors of his fleet are impatient to join their comrades who fight for the constitution and good laws.

The Reduction Works.

It is stated that the Reno Reduction Works, which were destroyed by fire last year, are to be rebuilt at an early day. The suit which the State brought against the company to determine the right to the water power has been dismissed and the title of the company is perfect. Archie Farrington, a prominent member of the company, says the works are certain to be rebuilt.
