**THE WAR ON MR. BLAINE.**

James G. Blaine is a typical American—keen, alert, pertinacious and resourceful. By his own exertions he has raised himself to a place among the foremost statesmen of the world.

He has labored unsparingly to advance the interests of the country, patiently enduring reproach, calumny and misrepresentation.

The benefits of the policy of reciprocity suggested by him are already being experienced by the nation, and the diplomatic controversies in which he has been engaged bid fair to be settled advantageously to the United States.

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
