Ordinance No. 84.

An Ordinance providing for summary trials and proceedings in cases of violations of the Police Ordinances of Carson City. The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain: Section 1. The trial and proceedings in all cases wherein any person or persons are charged with violating any ordinance or provision of an ordinance of Carson City of a police nature, shall be summary in character and tried by the Recorder of Carson City, without a jury.

ALL FOR OUR COUNTRY.

THE PUBLIC SPIRITED FEELING FOR THE FAIR. Representative Men Express themselves and Most all Agree One With the Other.

Public opinion is always the best in matters that directly concern the people. This paper is always willing and anxious to secure their opinions in everything. With this desire in view we here give our readers an opportunity of reading the various opinions in regard to the District Fair. Every one has some distinct idea concerning the methods employed, the advantages derived and the general management.

Doubtless there may be expressions in these columns today that will not meet with the approval of every individual, but by massing them a better idea of the culmination success may be formed than by any other course. The APPEAL endeavors in this article to give everyone an opportunity to observe the natural bent of the men who are interested in our State, and by these opinions we may all come to a rapid conclusion as to their worth.

STATE OFFICIALS. Governor Colcord— We can accomplish considerable by having good, honest races. This will draw the crowd and we can then introduce natural advantages. Our mineral resources are known to the world, but in agriculture we are comparatively in the dark. The latter must be advanced.

R. L. Horton— The main feature in the matter of display should be agricultural, although we have in this district some of the best mines in the world. I also think all exhibitors should be encouraged by slight premiums to show that their efforts are appreciated.

O. H. Grey— A stock parade is necessary, as it brings together the best blood among our animals. The expenditure of money for horse racing is always a good plan, as without racing a fair would be a failure. Everybody must think of the future good and strive to do his share.

MINT OPINIONS. T. R. Hofer, Acting Superintendent— This district is now in a better condition than ever before. We have almost every branch of industry within its limits. The farmers have lifted it up with wonderful energy, and the mines are constantly developing. Stock raising has always been a success in this State when carefully managed. In fact there should be a general massing of these three branches, that the public may satisfy themselves as to which takes precedence. The Directors are alive to all benefits derived, and will cooperate with the people.

Charles Colburn, Head Coiner— Put the Nevada productions before the people and pay less attention to horse racing. True, 'tis a drawing card and brings many people to us, but at the same time a certain element is brought here that bring little money and take considerable out. This class is undesirable. Pine Nut is a new mining country and ought to be represented. What we want is a general hanging together.

Charles Watson, acting chief assayer— This country is mineral and if it is opened up it will do as much for the State as anything. Exhibit our specimens to the stranger who will naturally flock here. Let the farmers come to the front and show their stock, fruits and cereals. We need them all.

E. B. Zabriskie, Meiter and Refiner— Newspapers should all tell the truth about us and get their statements correct. You are the man I am talking to. Get all you can in the Pavilion and arrange it tastefully, as we can convince the most skeptical of our power in the matter of supplying our own demands.

THE MERCHANTS TALK. Gilbert Briggs— The absence of a pavilion last

year disgusted the Douglas county workers and deprived them of making a display of their pride— agricultural products. This year has conquered them, and the hall will be jammed full of the fruits of their labor. I am with the ranchers.

Eli Barclay— I find an excellent market for Nevada fruit and considerable of it exceeds the California production. Let this branch be represented and increased as it is now in its infancy.

E. Burlington— There is nothing like unity of action. These three counties are second to none in the State and every man in them should realize it. Induce every body to visit the pavilion as there we will be put before the public in our true light.

Jim Raycraft— There's only one thing to be done and that is to have something of everything in the pavilion and do all we can to display it well.

E. James— People outside of this State think we are hoosiers and ignoramus but there is as much culture in Nevada as any other State. People who have interested themselves in the arts and sciences should exhibit their collections. Of course the industries take the lead in all things and should be so recognized.

A. C. Hofer— Every merchant in Carson City must wave all petty spite and put his shoulder to the wheel as if it were for his individual interest.

Tracy Chedie— If I display any portion of my stock of eastern goods it will not benefit us one bit, but there are some things raised right here in Nevada that are a credit to us. Those above all should be pushed to the front.

M. Cohn— Though I have long been a dry goods man I shall devote my time to the soil in this Fair. Nothing that I can secure in the way of Nevada products will go unexhibited and I intend to take Douglas county from stem to stem and show people what can be done with our irrigation.

O. Roberts— Try and make it so interesting that people will want to come to Carson again. Extend to them all the courtesy we can and they will advertise us.

Bill Blackmore— The desolate and sage-covered waste I drove stage through in the 50's and 60's is now waving with wheat and rye fields, the foot hills are dotted with farm houses, and droves of horses and cattle. This tells people what to exhibit.

Lack of space prevents further discussion of this matter but the above quotations will give any sensible man an idea of the strong feeling of regard that exists for this little corner of a State that is not dead yet. We are few, but as far upon the highway of advancement as willing hands can urge us, there we'll be, ready for the next stride. From the number of people we meet, who are with the District, it appears that the croakers and slanders have left, disgusted with our prosperity.
