THE BOARD LISTENS.

Representatives of the R. R. Explain Their Cases.

The Board met at 10 A. M. yesterday morning. All present.

The first case to be heard was that of the Union Pacific, represented by O. H. Swingley, of Omaha, Nebraska. An investigation of the Oregon Short Line, Utah Northern, the property of the U. P., brought out the fact that nothing but the grading was completed. There are no culverts, bridges or material of any kind on the ground. The earth has simply been thrown up along the line and no other improvements made. By an unanimous vote it was decided to lift the \$2000 assessment placed upon each of the fifty miles of this grade by the County Assessor of Lincoln county by striking from his roll such assessments.

E. Black Ryan, the Auditor of the C. P. R. R., appeared before the Board and answered questions put to him by the members. His statements were all clean cut and to the point.

C. W. Hinchcliffe, Supr. and acting Treasurer, and Secretary of the Nevada Central, running from Battle Mountain to Austin, stated that he desired no reduction from the rate paid last year and that the syndicate in New York controlling it, would dispose of the road to any buyer at the figures quoted on the Assessors' books of 1891.

What the Board will do with these matters will not be known until today or tomorrow when the session will come to a close. There may be changes in many counties both pro and con that will surprise the taxpayers.

No paper will be issued from this office tomorrow but Sunday's edition will contain a full statement of the changes which are to take place.

H. M. Yeington appeared for the V. & T. and requested the Board to accept the figures he filed as the true value of the road and assess accordingly, as everything was included in the report.

Missouri's Ex-Governor Suicides.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 23.—A special from Marysville, Mo., says: Ex-Governor Albert P. Moorehead committed suicide at his residence this morning. Several weeks ago the Governor was violently over-heated while driving cattle and has been in a nervous condition since. At times he has been delirious and very much depressed.

He was taken out for a drive by a friend, but became so much excited that he was brought home and physicians called. He became quieter during the night and this morning was sleeping quietly. While the watchers were in another room he cut a gash in the left side of his throat about four inches long with a common pocket knife.

Chance for a Big Race.

W. S. Hobart, one of the owners of the Lake View wood and lumber yard and flume, and the owner of Stamboul, the fast stallion, has been challenged by the owner of Nelson, record 2:10, to trot a race for \$5,000 a side. Stamboul trotted in 2:12 a year ago, and if no accident has happened to him he ought to reduce that time by two seconds and a half. He is, moreover, the handsomest horse that ever trotted in America, and he is about the level-headed, bravest horse that ever went under a string.
