JUDGE DENSON'S TROUBLE

An Old Carsonite Charged With Crime.

The City papers are just now publishing some very sensational charges against Judge Denson, a former resident of this city and a brother-in-law to Judge Beatty. He is charged with trying to assist Whittier, of the firm of Whittier, Fuller & Co., in freezing out Fuller for slandering his character and blackmailing him.

It is alleged that part of the conspiracy was to induce a Miss Kendall to bring an action for seduction against Fuller etc.

The Examiner's story is that Denson went to the girl's room to get her to sign a paper and was caught in a compromising position.

In this connection the Judge's denial is published, as there are two sides to every story.

Judge Denson has stated to a Chronicle reporter that he is the victim of a "damnable conspiracy" and that he will make several parties "small bitstone" before he is through with them.

He furthermore stated that he was solicited to act as Miss Kendall's attorney in a suit she proposed to bring against Fuller. Having consented to see her, she at several interviews refused to state her grievances, but finally asked him to call at her rooms on Friday when she would give him a written statement.

"No sooner was I in the room," said Denson, "than the woman, who was in bed, began making advances toward me which could mean but one thing. Up to that moment I had no suspicion she was other than she claimed to be, a woman who had been grossly wronged by Fuller. As soon as I realized what she was attempting to do, I saw the peril of my position, I said to her, rising to leave the room, 'You will have to send me that statement. I am too busy to wait for it.' In an instant she sprang from the bed, threw one arm around me, and as I broke away from her, she threw herself back and screamed. The door in an adjoining room was flung open and four men confronted me. I admit that for a moment I was dazed but I deny emphatically I made any such admissions or statements as they allege I made concerning Mr. Whittier or myself. I made no plea for mercy and no confession."

A Good Mine.

Joe Carney of Coleville, Mono county, California, was in town during Fair week, and in conversation with an APPEAL reporter said the Pin Hook mine was looking like a bonanza. He stated that rock had been taken out that assayed \$8,146 in gold and silver to the ton and that the lowest assay obtained from rock taken from the ledge recently struck went \$76 in gold and silver. He also informed the reporter that Charley Bray, A. C. Pratt and Captain Witherell had purchased a five-stamp mill and would have it ready next Spring to crush ore. The Pin Hook mine is located about two miles north of the old Hoyo bridge, Walker River, and about five miles from A. C. Pratt's mine. The owners, M. Carney, James Job and J. R. Crawford, have put in considerable time and labor searching for the ledge recently discovered. The ledge is five feet wide and has been drifted into for fifty feet. There are two shafts, one 80 and the other 120 feet deep, and both pass through small ledges or veins. The owners deserve success for their energy and pluck.

The country is what is called a blind ledge country and is said to be very rich in minerals. Parties acquainted with this country say there will be a lively mining camp in that section before many years go by.
