A Fatal Accident. Yesterday morning Lillie, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Cross, a handsome and sprightly child, was shot and fatally wounded by the accidental discharge of the Winchester rifle which her uncle, Granville Johnson, a lad of about thirteen years of age, was unloading. Mrs. Cross, whose husband was employed at Floriston, was calling at her mother's, Mrs. Josiah Johnson, who lives on South Virginia street. Young Johnson was emptying the magazine of the rifle for the purpose of cleaning the gun and had extracted several cartridges. Just as the little girl, who was playing, passed in front of the muzzle of the gun one of the cartridges exploded and struck the child near the navel, penetrating the abdominal cavity and inflicting a wound which proved fatal.
