Snow has fallen in the Upper Sagitt Valley, Wash.

Work on Sacramento's Post-office has been discontinued until next April.

A dispute as to the ownership of the Better Time at San Jose, is leading to litigation and libel suits.

The miners on the Venus quartz mine at Camanche have filed liens on the property and struck for back pay.

The newly discovered borax bed near Elenburg, Washington, is reported to be eighteen feet deep and 50 per cent. pure.

Mrs. Smith a well known resident of Marysville, fell down the other day and burst a blood vessel, which resulted in her death.

Although officers have searched the canyons of Bear and American rivers for evidence of the Colfax train robbers none has been found.

The second trial of W. H. Culver, one of the Willows men charged with fraudulently conducting the election in 1890, when Willows was a part of Colusa county, has begun at Marysville.

A gold quartz nugget of the value of \$1,400 was found Monday afternoon, lying in the bed rock of the Washington mine at Iowa Hill.

A jury at Salinas has been trying a private detective named Brooks, who is charged with getting a man drunk and urging him to set fire to an unoccupied building and then arresting him for arson.

A suit for \$884 has been commenced against Collector of Customs Bradshaw at Port Townsend by the owners of the British tug Lorne for illegal seizure.

Census Report of Live Stock.

A census bulletin on range live-stock has been issued at Washington. It says: "Outside of the stock taken by the regular enumerators as 'on farms,' this investigation covers upon the ranges in California, in the census year 1891 241,300 cattle, 22,547 horses, 148 mules, 897,877 sheep and 9,110 swine, with 1,782 men employed as herders, etc. The figures for the range stock in Eastern Oregon are: Cattle 263,591, horses 24,469, sheep 1,170,116. Washington cannot make a larger claim to be a range-state. The wheat-growers are rapidly appropriating the ranges, and only ten counties, located in the eastern part of the State, have stock ranges, and these in limited numbers. The loss in 1889 by winter storms is estimated at fully 50 per cent of all stock. The number of range cattle is given at 61,165 range horses at 24,299, and sheep at 208,218. In 1880 Washington as a Territory was a flourishing grazing district. It is now a flourishing wheat field. The ranges of Arizona are not, as a rule, overcrowded, and wool-growers have not as yet occupied extensive ranges, except in Apache and Yavapai counties. The range stock in Arizona is reported as follows: Cattle 656,758 horses 18,557, mules and burros 1,203, sheep 41,768, swine 3,013. On account of the very protracted dry spells of late years, the industry in Nevada has been much depressed. No figures are given for Nevada."

The census cost the people over \$7,000,000 and further appropriations are asked for, yet it is valueless so far as it relates to Nevada. Reno, the second largest town in the State, is omitted from the report on population, and no figures are given to indicate the live stock in the State.

The Russia Famine.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 14.—The Government is negotiating for the purchase of large quantities of breadstuffs in the United States. The Chronicle has a dispatch from Paris saying that the Hebrew bankers there, are combining to render nugatory all efforts to float the Russian loan.

Medical councils have been summoned in the distressed provinces of the Empire. Scoury and typhus are raging in the wake of the famine.

The Novosti says that famine prevails in thirteen different governments of the country, and 14,000,000 persons are in urgent need of succor.

The government is purchasing corn for the famishing peasants of the stricken districts during the winter months.
