CHINESE LOTTERIES.

Will the District Attorney Suppress Them? There are now running full blast in Chinatown four Chinese lotteries, each one of which has a drawings twice a day, thus making eight drawings in all. These lotteries are patronized very extensively by white people, and boys, girls and women all over town dip into the pot of speculation. These lotteries have been running for a long time, and their presence in our midst has been a source of general comment. When Mr. Summerfield was appointed District Attorney by the Board of County Commissioners it was generally accepted by the public as a move on the part of the authorities to stamp out the evil. Mr. Summerfield has a well established anti-lottery record, and is a young man full of activity and zeal. If there is any one man in the county who can make a thorough fight against lotteries it is Mr. Sardis Summerfield, and he could also count on the backing of several earnest and influential citizens. We believe there is a large field for conscientious missionary work in Chinatown for our new and able District Attorney. The law is violated openly and flagrantly eight times a day, and there can be no special difficulty in securing the necessary evidence to convict. The APPEAL would like to see Mr Summerfield addressing a jury in such a case. There would be a fine opportunity for a display of righteous indignation and fervid eloquence, and it would no doubt draw a large and appreciative audience.

Combination Locomotives. The recently passed through Reno two ten wheel locomotives for the Southern Pacific R. R., known as the combination locomotive, and two more are on the way. They both have a high pressure and low pressure cylinder, and the steam is exhausted from the first into the low pressure, giving a double use of it and thus effecting a great saving of fuel. This type of engine is comparatively unknown in this country, though they are in considerable use in England. Last winter the Southern Pacific Co. made some experiments, converting an ordinary locomotive into a combination, and were so well pleased with the results that they ordered the four mentioned from the Schenectady works. They will run between Sacramento and San Francisco.
