SILVER IN EUROPE.

Friendliness for the White Metal.

A Washington special says: A feeling in favor of international bimetallism seems to be growing and to be likely to prevail in the European Cabinets, if the Europeans can be convinced that it does not intend to plunge them into free coinage.

Several gentlemen of high standing in private life agreed early in the Summer to make some inquiries of foreign financiers with the view of arriving at some international agreement, and to report the results to the President and Secretary of the Treasury without expense to the government.

They discovered such a friendly feeling to the use of silver in Europe that they recently asked and obtained credentials from our government showing who they are and what their instructions are without having any authority to commit the United States officially to any programme.

The fact that these credentials have been asked for is regarded by the President as a very encouraging indication of the feeling in England, France and Germany in regard to the remonetization of silver.

The gentlemen who have been making inquiries would not have asked for such credentials if they had not felt the time approaching for serious negotiations with the European powers, for they have no personal or financial interest in magnifying their office.

The Chico Champion, of Los Angeles county, says: Five hundred sacks, or 50,000 pounds of sugar, were run through the granulator and 30,000 pounds of this was direct product. On Wednesday 306 tons of beets were delivered at the factory, and yesterday all previous records were broken by bringing in 415 tons in about nine hours. Pretty lively work.
