SENATOR WILLIAMS FINED

For Swearing in the Court Room he is Tapped for \$50.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—A. C. Hamilton testified that he was once a director of the Hale & Norcross mine, but not during the time covered by the complaint, or since. When asked what his salary was as Superintendent of the Chollar and Potosi he declined to answer, and the Court sustained him, on the grounds of its not being connected with the issue. Evan Williams was recalled and asked if there were not deposits of bullion at the Mint in the name of Charles Peters. Mr. Williams—There probably were such deposits. He was then asked if they were for large amounts. Mr. Williams said he could not answer without consulting the books of the bank. He was then asked if he would produce the books. This he declined, as he did not think the business of the Bank was at all connected with the issues on trial. He would not, therefore, consent to expose the private business of the Bank's customers. Byron Waters, for defense, strenuously objected to the way prosecution was conducting the case. He denounced various speeches thrown in by attorneys for prosecution, as made with hope that they would be published in the newspapers and besmirch the reputation of the defendants. Williams, on being asked if bullion had been sent to the Mint after business hours, answered that it might have been done on arrival of late trains. The sensation of the day occurred when following question was asked the witness: "Do you know anything about the loss of two or five bars of bullion shipped from Placerville to Los Angeles, traced by Wells Fargo & Co. and claimed by you?" "I don't know anything about it, I never heard anything about it and anybody who says I did is a G—d——d liar." "You are fined fifty dollars for contempt of Court" replied Judge Hebbard. "Your Honor," said Mr. Williams "my reputation is at stake and I cannot quietly submit to such infamous insinuations." "I appreciate the situation and don't blame the witness for being angry but I must maintain the dignity of this Court" answered the Judge. After recess Cal. Wood asked that the fine be remitted as the witness had misunderstood the question. "I have a fixed rule," said Judge Hebbard "never to remit fines in this Court." The fine was then paid and the balance of the day was devoted to the examination of witnesses and details of milling.

A Lively Justice Court.

District Attorney Summerfield produced all the evidence in the Correcco trial to the Justice yesterday morning and the defendant was recalled, and pleaded guilty. He was fined \$1.00 and costs. The one dollar was paid but he was informed by some outsider that he could not be jailed for refusing to pay the costs of \$15, so he refused to do so. Justice Hawthorne says he will get it just the same. In the case of Uhl & Leonhardt against E. Bryan and wife to recover a meat bill of \$95. Judgement was given the plaintiffs with order to collect. Geo. Hark sued for the same cause and received judgment with order to collect also. His bill amounted to \$220.98. Bryan had mortgaged his property to his wife to evade this suit some time ago but the law says that property can not be mortgaged to the wife when the husband is insolvent, as was the case with Bryan. He also assigned his insurance policy which has not yet been cashed, the money being in the hands of the agent, J. D. Kersey and the plaintiffs will probably secure it.

Boistrous Breezes.
Yesterday morning the streets were swept clean by the terrific wind of the night before. The leaves of Autumn were tumbled skyward in clouds and came rattling down yesterday near Empire. The signal service flags on the Capitol were whipped into shreds and looked like the sign of a rag factory in the morning. The dainty but persistent zephyrs toyed with the elaborate canvas sign of Lind, the harness maker, and blended it into nothingness. If Mr. Lind advertised in the newspapers these accidents would not occur. Fences were blown down and a slight shower was wafted to us from the storm in the mountains.
